These are happy days for Jack Cotton, the athletic director of Farmington's public schools.
And, it's not because we're just into the new year and it's the thing to say: "Happy New Year."
Reason No. 1 for Cotton's happiness stems from an item he spotted in a sports publication which reached his desk the other morning.
Scanning through the contents, Cotton found a section devoted to the top track performers in the world during the "Sensational 60 s."

One name struck Cotton more than any other—REX CAWLEY.

The reason was obvious. It was Cawley who raced into the state prep spotlight during the late '50 s when he won hurdle title after burdle title in the colors of Farmington High. He not only won Michigan's Class A crown, but his record of 19 seconds set in winning the low hurdles in 1958 still stands.

FROM FARMINGTON Cawley went on to warmer climates to run for Southern California (remember the Trojans in the Rose Bowl, Michigan? and also to represent his country in Olympic and also to represent his country in Olympic and other world competition.

As a result of his brilliance, Cawley has been hailed as the premier 400-meter hurdler in the world for the 505.
