May Grow Rubber in Area  
In the southern part of Arizona the wild rubber plant grows abundantly, and may be cultivated in a large way if present experiments prove that it is a marketable quality of rubber may be extracted.

Swordfish a Mackerel Family.  
The swordfish is allied by family ties to the mackerel. It attains a length of from 12 to 15 feet and sometimes specimens 20 feet long have been caught. It has a much elongated upper jaw, which is the "sword," and this is commonly 10 to 15 times the length of the fish. The body is covered with silvery scales, its color is bluish-black above and silvery-white below, and the ventral fins are lacking. Neoplaton and Scyllium mackerels make great commerce of this fish and its flesh is held to be very palatable.
