The Farmington Library Board of Trustees issued thanks recently to all those in the community who have given money for library improvement.

These contributions are more important now than previously since we can foresee the great need in the next year or two to accumulate sufficient funds to meet the demands of book collections for the new library. The annual open meeting of the Farmington Friends of the Library will be held at 8 p.m. Jan. 28, in the Farmington Community Center. Due to the specific nature of the program, the members of the Farmington Historical Society will be special guests. The Friends of the Library would also like to emphasize that the annual meeting regularly is an open meeting to which the general public is invited and at which there is a planned program of general interest.

This year's speaker will be Richard Hathaway, who is head of the Michigan Unit of the State Library of Michigan.

His topic will be "Book Collecting and Rare Books with Special Reference to Michigan". In his talk, Hathaway will first identify different types of valuable books and discuss what goes into the making of a book that makes it worthwhile. The history of printing will be discussed briefly. Hathaway will also have books and materials on exhibit to illustrate his presentation. A discussion period will

conclude the program, and questions will be welcomed. Tom Czudzik, president of the Board of Trustees of the Farmington District Library will also be present at the annual meeting and during the business part of the meeting will present a report from the board concerning the progress of the new library.
