

# Pro will aid youth for Yo-Yolympics

Area youth have a chance to bone up on their yo-yoing with two practice clinics sponsored by the Farmington Area YMCA before entering the City Yo-Yolympic Tournament Monday, June 23.

Don LaPlante, a yo-yo professional from Duncan Toys to provide assistance and teach some new tricks at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 21 and at 1:30 p.m. Sunday, June 8. Both practice clinics will be given in the Y building, 28100 Farmington Road.

The Yo-Yolympics entrants will be divided into two categories: those 11 and under and those from 12-15. City winners will receive certificates and patches and will then advance to the state tournament.

Winners at the state level advance to a regional tournament in Ohio and these winners will receive \$100 scholarships and flow with their Parents to Universal City, Cal. for the national tournament.

First prize nationally is a \$1,000 scholarship. Second and third prizes are \$500 and \$250 scholarships.

The Yo-Yolympics are sponsored by Duncan Toy Co. and General Foods Co. The Farmington Y is host for both the practice clinics and the city tournament.

Registration is necessary only for the tournament on June 23, and can be done by calling the Y, 553-4020.

A June 1981 wedding is planned.

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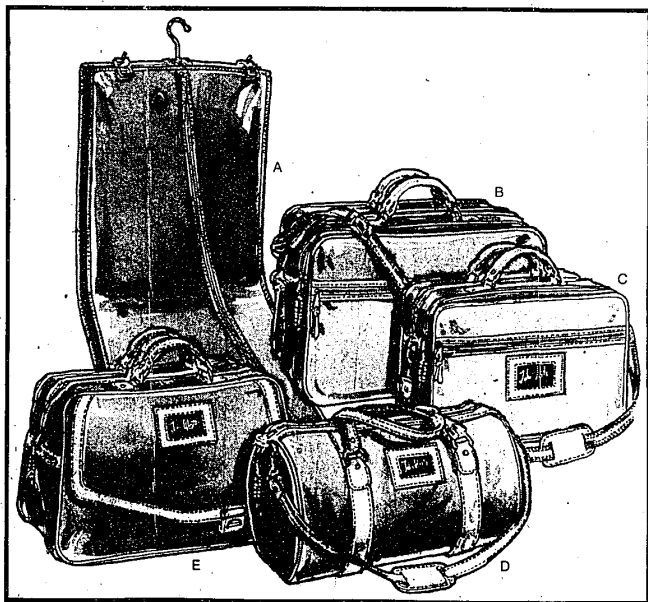
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
