Graduation gifts could be taxable

If you're thinking of giving gifts of cash or tangible assets to a graduate, you may be required to file gift tax returns.

The recipients of these gifts, however, don't need to report them on their income tax returns.

By making a graduation gift of up to \$3,000, say Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants, there isn't any requirement to pay a federal gift tax. If you and your spouse make

the gifts together, this increases the tax-free gift to \$6,000 to each person.

If a husband or wife is a graduate, there is a special provision of the tax laws which govern gifts to spouses.

Basically, a substantial amount of cash property can be transferred to a spouse without incurring gift or estate tax.

Giving shares of stock to a grandchild who is a graduate, say the CPAs, is a little more complex.

Parks department plans busy slate

Stave off youngsters' summer time blues through activities sponsored by the Farmington Hills Parks and Recreation Department.

All residents of Farmington, Farmington Hills and outlying areas within the Farmington school district are eligible for any activity or class offered by the department.

Registration will be accepted by mail or in person at the Farmington Hills Parks and Recreation Office, 31555 11 Mile near Orchard Lake Road.

Proof of residency may be requested upon registration. Waiting lists will be formed when the programs are filled and attempts will be made to accommodate persons on the lists.

Registration is on a first come, first served basis and can't be accomplished by phone.

Mailing in a registration form doesn't guarantee enrollment in limited activities. If the activity is filled, registrants will be notified.

Parents should accompany children to the first class meeting. Registration

for swimming lessons must be at the location which you wish to attend. Mail-in registration isn't valid for swim classes.

Non-residents will be assessed a \$2 additional fee for each class fee. Make checks payable to the Farmington Hills Parks and Recreation.

REFUNDS won't be given out after the second class meeting. A \$2 administrative fee will be withheld on all refunds unless the class was canceled by the department.

In case of sickness, refunds will be given. If the program has begun, a pro-rated amount will be determined.

Participants must apply for refunds in person at the parks and recreation office. They must have their program registration receipt unless they mailed in their registration. Refunds will be sent out in three weeks.

To help combat those "there's nothing to do" blues, the Farmington Parks and Recreation Department offers the following activities:

TEN FARMINGTON area play-

grounds will be open this summer with supervised activities such as sports, games, arts and crafts and special events.

All activities will include boys and girls from 6-13 years-old. Children must have completed the first grade to participate. The program will be open from 9-11:30 a.m. and from 12:30-3 p.m. Monday through Thursday, June 23-July 31 at the following centers: Flanders Elementary School, 32500 Flanders Road, Forest Elementary School, 34545 Old Timber, Gill Elementary School, 21195 Gill Road; Kenbrook Elementary School, 32180 Bonnet Hill; Larkshire Elementary School, 23800 Tuck and Longacre Elementary School, 34581 Arundel.

Other centers include: Middlebelt Elementary School, 24400 Middlebelt; William Grace Elementary School, 29400 Shawwassee; Wood Creek Elementary School, 29400 Harwich and Wooddale Elementary School, 28600 Peppermill.

There will be mobile recreation units

visiting the playgrounds this summer. This program includes a sportmobile filled with sporting equipment, an artmobile with arts and crafts and a skatemobile filled with music and roller skates.

There will be recreational open swim from 1-2:10 p.m. and from 2:20-3:30 p.m. at North Farmington and Farmington High Schools. Children's admission, 50 cents; adults, 10 and over, 75 cents. Bus transportation from recreation centers to the pool is 25 cents.

Water games will be the order of "Big Splash" day, beginning at 1 p.m. July 18.

Youth Olympics, including track and field events will be conducted at 5:45 p.m. July 22 at Farmington High School.

Winners of the Youth Olympics will compete against metropolitan area youths at 9:30 a.m. July 31 at Belle Isle.
