

Kidnap, murder cases in courts

A pre-trial examination has been scheduled July 21 in 47th District Court for two defendants charged with the June 25 kidnapping of Farmington Hills businessman Byung Park.

Defendants Gary Lee Kelley and Rick Scoogan waived their right to pre-trial exams within 12 days after their arrests in a motion before Judge Margaret G. Schaefer Wednesday afternoon.

Kelley, 22, and Scoogan, 19, both from Salt Lake City, Utah were sent back to the Oakland County Jail after their brief court appearance Wednesday.

They've been incarcerated since their June 25 arrests held on \$500,000 bond each. Both are represented by court-appointed attorneys.

The July 21 hearing before Judge Michael J. Hand will determine if there is cause to bind them over to Oakland County Circuit Court for trial.

PRE-EXAM CONFERENCES for two suspects charged with the June 16 slaying of a Farmington Hills gas station owner have been adjourned until July 21.

Attorneys for defendants Herbert M. Crosby and Darryl D. McMillan asked for the adjournment last Wednesday. Both men are charged with first degree murder and are being held without bond in the Oakland County Jail.

A third defendant, Adrian L. Fleming, charged with larceny, waived his hearing to circuit court Wednesday. An exam is scheduled before Judge Gene Schmelz July 24.

Space Day hailed at Orchard Ridge

Space Day 1980, a celebration and commemoration of the eleventh anniversary of Apollo 11, will be at Orchard Ridge campus of Oakland Community College on July 20.
Apollo 11 was the first moon landing mission.
Sponsored by the Detroit Metro L5 Society, the day's events will provide a look at the national effort which made Apollo possible, as well as a look ahead at man's future in outer space.
Activities will begin at noon and last until 5 p.m. Admission is \$2 in advance mailed to Space Day, 16644 Birchwood, Detroit 48221. Cost is \$1.50 for students. Price at the door will be \$3 general and \$2.50 for students.
Proceeds go to the advancement of space research and promotion.
At noon, a keynote address by the chapter's president, Bernard Short, will kick off the day's activities.
There will be continually running films after the address. Among films to be shown will be "Universe", narrated by William Shatner, "Libra", a film which deals with some of the social and economic ramifications of the first space colony; and NASA films on Apollo 11 and Skylab.

Both the Warren Astronomical and Livonia Astronomy societies will be present.
Members will show visitors how to explore the universe from their own backyards. The film, "Chasing the Eclipse," will show one of the examples of amateur and professional astronomers at work, viewing the magnificent celestial event, the total solar eclipse.
A telescope set up outside the campus 'A' building will allow daytime viewing of the sun with a special hydrogen alpha filter.
Also outside that building will be a specially equipped GMC motor home on loan from the Space Research Institute of the University of Michigan.
The mobile space museum will have space memorabilia as well as computer games such as "lunar landing." Inside the building will be slide shows, lectures and discussions on solar power satellites, the space shuttle.

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
