It's almost business as usual for the lumberyard out on Haggerty Road, across the border from West Bloom-field Township. For Haggerty Lumber and Supply Co, that is no small feat. After a May 8 fire that took firefighters from 13 departments to estinguish, the business is apparently thriving, and speculation is

"We delivered the next morning with our trucks weaving in and out around

the fire engines," O'Riley said. "We registered cash sales Monday and would have opened Sunday, but it was Mother's Day.

EMPLOYEES OF HAGGERTY were at the lumberyard as soon sible, helping to pick up debris.

"I remember that Saturday," O'Riley said. "There were huge throngs of ecople in Washington looking for handouts because they had no jobs. People were here cleaning up.

few employees lost more than a handful of working days.

"Most of our people are from the area," he said. "They're some pretty tough people and have pretty deep stock here." Many Haggerty employees have worked at the lumberyard for no 15 years, according to O'Riley. For many, it has been their first and only job, creating an organization of 'pride-full' people, he said.

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
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
