

Trustees may seek injunction

UNRESOLVED ISSUES are wages and retention of fully paid fringe benefits.

Delavan W. Sipes, teacher's union president told the board Wednesday that the teachers want "a 9 to 10-percent (salary) increase per year without rollbacks."

"There is no acceptable reason why you cannot produce a settlement in line with others (school districts) in this area," he said. A two-year contract is being considered.

Sipes confirmed that the faculty sought an 8 percent raise per year during meetings with the mediator last Friday.

"We won't go back to those kinds of percentages," he said. "That was made to avoid a strike."

THE COLLEGE last Friday offered the full-time instructors 8 percent the first year and 7.25 percent the second.

Sipes said the two sides were "quite, quite close" to a settlement last Friday during an all-day meeting with the mediator.

But any possible agreement was off Sunday, according to Sipes, when the union discovered that the college was proposing to take money for the full-time instructors' second year increase from the part-timers package.

SCHOOLCRAFT PRESIDENT C. Nelson Grote said in a written statement Tuesday that the college could only provide an 8 percent increase for full-time faculty during 1981/82 "by shifting money away from proposed part-time faculty raises."

Part-time pay is "extremely low," at Schoolcraft, said Grote. He said the college proposed increases for part-timers averaged 14 percent effective this

coming winter semester and 13 percent the following winter semester.

The college said Tuesday the only remaining issue was the full-time faculty raise in the second year of the contract.

Sipes said the other major issue was continuation of fully-paid medical insurance. The college had proposed faculty members pay an out-of-pocket share of the medical insurance costs during the next two years.

A guaranteed workload for full-time instructors, which the faculty said last week was a strike issue, was apparently resolved last Friday.

Picketing began at 7 a.m. Tuesday at the Haggerty Road campus and at the Garden City Center on Harrison St.

The strike is the second at Schoolcraft in two years. After an eight-school-day strike in 1978, the unresolved issues were sent to fact finding and later accepted by both sides.

An estimated 90 percent of Schoolcraft's full-time instructors make the maximum allowed under the expired contract — at least \$24,300 a year.
