Seaholm nudges Troy, 3-0

Troy High School, welcome to the Southeastern Michigan Association.

The Colts played their first SMA football game Friday against Birmingham Seaholm.

And it was what could be loosely termed a defensive battle — Seaholm won 3-0 on the strength of a Mike Landy field goal.

"We thought we played real well," said Troy coach Jeff Keller. "We played well enough to beat them, but they capitalized on our mistakes."

Seaholm's defense, appropriately enough, set up the winning field goal. Troy had the ball on the 31 with less than two minutes to go in the first half. Three consecutive running plays produced no gain. Roy Morris, last year's Eccentric All-Area punter, dropped back to kick, but the snap was over his head.

MORRIS PICKED up the ball and tried to run with it, but he was tackled at the Troy six-yard line by Seaholm's Steve Leigh.

Seaholm had the ball first and goal at the six with plenty of time to score. So the Maples ran Dave Harris on a slant at the Troy line.

Troy stacked him up for no gain.

Quarterback Pat O'Toole tried to pass on the second down.

And Troy batted it down for no gain.

The Maples ran Harris up the middle again.

And Troy stopped him for no gain.

It looked for a moment as if Seaholm would try to ram the ball in on the fourth down, but coach Chuck Skinner reconsidered and sent Landy in for the field goal. His kick — the winning kick — split the uprights with 34 seconds left in the half.

"I THINK both teams played good defense," said Skinner. "I really do. I can't believe we didn't move the ball better."

"Either they're a very great defensive team, or we're very poor on offense."

Troy had its chances earlier in the game. The Colts drove the ball from their own 32 in 11 plays to the Seaholm nine on their first possession of the second quarter.

But the drive stalled on the nine. A personal foul moved it back to the 24. Quarterback Brian Marzolf — who sparked the drive with two good runs — was sacked back to the Seaholm 35. An incomplete pass on the next play made it fourth and 35, and brought on Morris for a field goal attempt.

The kick was within his range, but the Maples broke through and blocked it.

"Our kicker has kicked 50-yard field goals," said Keller, "and then we get a bad snap, bad set, and we had some problems that way."

That blocked field goal was as close as Troy came all night. And Seaholm's field goal was as close as the Maples were able to come all night.

Defense was really the story Friday. And that defense — at least on Troy's part — may have been keyed by some things that happened last year.

"Their team was certainly up for the game," said Skinner. "They were really up. As you know, we had a few players move over from there, and there is a little rivalry."

"I KNOW THEY were up, and they played a real fine game. We're just happy we won it."

"They (the Colts) were up for the game," said Keller. "They were ready. We were prepared mentally, we were all set to go. We turned the ball over, and they took advantage of it. You turn the ball over that close to the goal line and only give up three points — that's tremendous."

Those sticky defenses resulted in some poor statistics for the offense — Troy's offense gained 110 yards total, and Seaholm's gained 137.

"Last week," said Keller, "we had 227 yards on offense."

Things don't get any easier for Troy. The Colts, 0-2 overall, swing into the heart of their SMA schedule with a game Friday at Hazel Park. The Vikings won the SMA championship last year and were semi-finalists in the state playoffs.

Seaholm, 1-1, hosts Ferndale at 8 p.m. Friday.

Robichaud trips Clarencville

As far as football games go, it probably won't go down as one of the more exciting, memorable confrontations in gridiron history.

Dearborn Heights Robichaud marched 53 yards in nine plays during its first offensive possession and made the points stand up for a 6-0 win Friday over Clarencville.

The Trojans, who ran three plays without a huddle after taking the opening kickoff only to gain a total of one yard, didn't fare much better when they huddled before every play.

Clarencville, normally an explosive offensive team, totalled only 127 yards in 110 rushing — on only 43 plays from scrimmage.

In fact, the entire game reflected the drizzling conditions under which it was played. Both teams seemed sluggish, slow and in no hurry to put the ball into play.

Clarencville coach Ralph Weddle seemed stunned with the outcome.

"I don't know — I can't explain it," he said. "I can't believe it."

Camille Swasey scored the only touchdown of the game on a one-yard plunge up the middle. Sydney Brisbane, Robichaud's quarterback, completed two passes for sizeable gains — one of 28 yards, the other of 18 — during the drive.

The Trojans sputtered on offense virtually the entire game. One of their best scoring chances oc-

curred late in the third quarter when they recovered a fumble at Robichaud's 15 yard line.

A delay-of-game penalty on a fourth-and-one situation necessitated a six-yard gain and a pass by Tom Bass fell incomplete allowing Robichaud to take possession.

Jim Thompson, starting fullback for the Trojans, suffered a shoulder injury on the play and was taken to the hospital by ambulance. The severity of the injury was not immediately known.

Bass had not practiced since Tuesday when he had a minor surgery on his nose. "Don't use that as an excuse, though," Weddle said.

Normally a better-than-average passer, Bass completed only three of nine and had three intercepted.

One of his tosses was picked off at Robichaud's five yard line midway through the third quarter. The Trojans had driven down field from their own 31.

"They (Robichaud) had a tough, tough defense," Weddle said. "I'm not making excuses. They beat us in the trenches where it really counts. Our offensive line just didn't do it. Their defensive backs were fast and we couldn't shake loose."

"I knew they had a good passer (Brisbane). He's a scrambler like Fran Tarkenton," Weddle continued. "You think you have him, then he's gone."

Brisbane, a senior, completed seven of 13 passes for 142 yards.

"They (receivers) were too open," Weddle said. "Sometimes it was sickening."

One area in which Weddle said he was pleased with his team's performance was defense against the run. That, for all intents and purposes, was the only bright spot he saw in an otherwise gloomy afternoon.
