YWCA Sponsors Third Job Clinic

The third Self-Start Job Clinic for women interested in re-entering the labor market will begin Feb. 16 at the Northwest Branch YWCA, 25290 Grand River.

The program which will be held for three sessions on Feb. 16 and 23 and March 2 is designed especially for women who are interested in investing some of their time outside the home and want information on the wide range of opportunities available to them.

This is the third year that such a workshop has been offered by Northwest Branch YWCA and over 100 women have responded to each of the previous programs. The workshop begins at 9:30 a.m. in the morning and runs until 2:30 p.m.

This year's self-start will open with an address by Mrs. Lucille Cantoni, director of Family Services of Metropolitan Detroit.

Her topic will be "The Second Identity Crisis."

With her experience in counseling, she will be able to give her audience some guidelines for assessing their present situations, determining their specific needs and making the most of the resources that will be available to them in the self-start program.

The afternoon will be devoted to education and training opportunities. A five-member panel representing colleges, business and nursing schools will present a wide range of opportunities in this area.

THE SECOND DAY, Feb. 23, will begin with a panel discussion of community service opportunities. Members of the panel will be women who are actively involved in volunteer work themselves.

Also on that morning, a representative from Michigan Employment Securities Commission will give tips on how to prepare for job testing and tell what to expect.

On the afternoon of Feb. 23,

and on the morning of March 2, representatives from various employment fields will meet with the women in small discussion groups where individual situations can be considered. As much information as possible on part time jobs will be given.

Jane Towater, program coordinator for the YWCA Metropolitan Detroit, will give "Application and Interview Tips" on the afternoon of the final day.

The closing address will be given by Mrs. Jessie Schroeder, director of training for the J.L. Hudson Co. Mrs. Schroeder was selected by the Chamber of Commerce as one of the Detroit Area's Top 10 Working Women in 1969.

MRS. SCHROEDER, Mrs. Cantoni, and many of the other resource people scheduled to speak, are quite familiar with the problems their audience will face for they have also taken "time off" from family responsibilities before becoming involved outside the home.

Self Start is offered by the YWCA free of charge and without the usual YW membership requirements. It is offered as a community service to all interested women. Pre-registration is required by sending your name, address, and phone number to: "Self Start," Northwest Branch YWCA, 25290 Grand River, Detroit 48210.

Coffee will be available at 9:30 a.m. and again during the lunch hour. Participants may either bring a sack lunch or buy a hot sandwich from the YWCA kitchen.

High Meat Costs May Reflect Your Expensive Tastes

Many of the disgruntled housewives pushing for reduction in meat costs at the marketplace often are the victims of their own taste buds and growing family income, rather than the actual price of meat. Grocery costs have long lagged behind the higher costs of living despite the veil of "fool" by the ladies of the land. Thus what is a more probable cause of higher food bills is the rising paychecks of the inflationary times which in turn bubble up more and better quality groceries than ever before.

FOR INSTANCE when shopping, those lamb, chops and those good looking steak cuts once too expensive to buy are now tossed into the shopping bags at a higher percentage rate than ever before. So, because the grocery bill is more, food eaters are unjustly upset. It's not so much the price as it is the family's change of diet. But of course it doesn't take an economic wizard to discover a family eats better as income increases, but by revealing the obvious - "other meat" facts - see otherwise unavailable, come to the forefront.

At least that's what's indicated by the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago Agricultural Letter in a survey of meat data. For instance, they say that higher income families, as compared with lower income families eat more beef, veal, lamb and less of all pork and poultry. Furthermore, the report states that a 10% increase in income is associated with a 3% increase in beef consumption.

THERE'S SNOB APPEAL in the shopper's cart too. Apparently pork and poultry do not have the prestige or status associated with beef. Studies indicate that these "meats" are not as responsive to changes in income as beef.




