

Mercy rips Birmingham Marian, 70-51

They were yelling and screaming and jumping up and down Thursday when the Farmington Hills Our Lady of Mercy basketball team invaded the Birmingham Marian gymnasium.

And that was just for the junior varsity game.

At least they were sitting down during part of the JV game. There were some members of the Mercy cheering section who didn't sit down at all during the varsity game.

And they had good reason to stay on their feet. Mercy maintained its perfect record, beating a tough Marian team 70-51.

"We had our best offensive half in about three weeks," said Mercy coach Larry Baker.

TRY FIGURING out which half Baker was talking about — the Marlins scored 35 in the first half and 35 in the second.

"They (Mercy) played like a 14-0 team tonight," said Marian coach Karen Lafata. "They did everything better than we did."

"They came out more aggressively. They came out, they pressed, they played defense on us a lot tougher than last time."

Mercy opened the game with a full-court, man-to-man press. That alignment seemed to confuse the Mustangs. They turned the ball over several times in the first quarter, and Mercy had an 18-0 lead at the buzzer.

"That's the first time all year that I've gone man-to-man full court," said Baker, "so they were a little confused."

Marian tried a little man-to-man full court of its own in the second quarter, but it only worked for a little while. The Mustangs managed to pull within three points, 23-20, on a turnaround jumper by Sue Flood at 3:24 of the quarter.

BUT MERCY outscored Marian 12-8 over the next three minutes to hold onto an eight-point lead at the half.

The Marlins put it all together in the third quarter. They held Marian to just three field goals — six points — while rolling up 17.

Mercy still outscored Marian in the final quarter, 18-17, to take the 19-point win.

The Marlins put on an offensive

show. Suzanne Dietz and Kathy Landry led Mercy with 19 and 14 points respectively, and Karen Shook added 14.

Just about everyone who played scored at least one field goal.

"THE KEY TO our game," said Baker, "is that at any given time we can have five girls out there who are able to score."

The Marlins made their shot selection count — they hit on 34 of 59 attempts for 57 percent.

"They shot 57 percent," marveled Lafata. "Let's face it, the Detroit Pistons don't shoot 57 percent."

"We shot 31 percent," she continued,

"which is average shooting for a high school girls' team."

Flood — who was able to get back into the game for a brief stint in the fourth quarter — finished high for Marian with 16 points. Teammate Kris Dill had 12.

Mercy is 14-0 overall, 9-0 in the Central Division of the Catholic League. The Marlins are on the road against Detroit Dominican on Tuesday.

Marian is 9-5 overall, 5-4 in the Central Division. The Mustangs are also on the road, traveling to Redford for a game against Bishop Borgess.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY COUNCIL MEETING

October 27, 1980

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills held a regular meeting October 27, 1980. Mayor Soronen presided at 7:30 o'clock P.M. Members present were: Burwell, Lange, Soronen, Wolf, Alkateeb and Dolan. Absent: Oppenbacher. Others present were City Manager Savage, City Clerk Cairns and City Attorney Bibeau.

Council approved the minutes of September 15, October 14 and October 20, 1980. Council introduced the Amended Zoning Ordinance C22-227, rezoning lots 40 & 41 of Supervisor's Plat of Woodcreek Farms, from RA-1 to OS-C. Zoning Ordinance C22-230 to remove from RA-1 to IRO located at Howard Road at Halsted, just south of the DPW building was approved.

Necessity Hearing for sewer improvement on Howard Road was set for November 17, 1980, also for water improvement. Cost Hearing for water improvement on Watt and Grayfield is set for November 17, 1980.

Request from Foodmaker, Inc., Mountain Jacks for a new Danon Permit to be held in conjunction with the 1980 Class C license located at 21257 Sincicola Court was tabled. Approval was given the request from the City of Wayne re Resolution consenting to the transfer of employment for Perkins Engines, Inc., to the City of Wayne.

The Mayor's appointment of David L. Litogot to the Historical Commission term to expire June 3, 1982 and Lawrence Savage to the Economic Development Corporation term to expire August 13, 1986 were approved.

Council approved executive session regarding pending litigation negotiations. Upon the recommendation of the City Manager, Council approved the establishment of Assistant City Manager position to strengthen central management controls, salary to be taken from unappropriated fund.

Upon motion meeting adjourned.
