Among his past accomplishments are serving as vice president of governmental affairs for the U.S. Jaycees and president of the U.S. Jaycees.

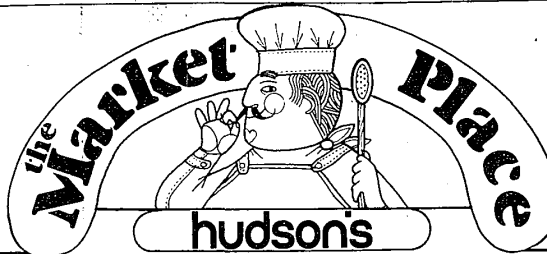
In 1965 he was an advisor to Gov. George Romney and served with the Romney for President Committee in 1967-68.
