Dearborn and Ford presently are members with Wayne and Ypsilanti Highs in the four-team Saultrail League.

Everyone who has anything to do with prep sports not only wants to be present. . but IS present.

Every principal, depending on the classification of his school, is permitted a maximum number of tickets which he may purchase for the final program. Very few don't take all they can get.
