Nursing Arts Group Lists Farmington Program

FARMINGTON Farmington Schools' nursing arts advisory committee met recently at Farmington High School. Purpose of the group was to outline phases of the nursing program conducted by the vocational education department.

Those present were Mrs. Mary Wilson, in-service director for Botsford General Hospital; Mrs. Dorothy Burch, teacher-coordinator for Farmington High School; and Earl Baumunk, director of vocational education.

Performance tasks that a student must master in order to be employed as a nursing assistant were enumerated.

She must dress appropriately and be sure to wash her hands before going on duty.

She must be able to identify all equipment and supplies used by nursing assistants, take temperatures, pulse, respiration and blood pressure.

She must be capable of making an occupied or unoccupied bed, serving fresh water, food trays and extra nourishment, feeding a patient and giving bed baths, giving back rubs, combing hair, and generally caring for a patient's comfort.

Three scouts of Troop 110, of Farmington received the Ad Altare Dei Award for combined service to church and community recently.

Edwin Simposki, Jerry Delaney and Mike Schaeffer received the award at Our Lady of Sorrows Church from Fr. Chris Schneider, O.F.M., who is himself an Eagle Scout.

Schedule Free Classes On Diabetes

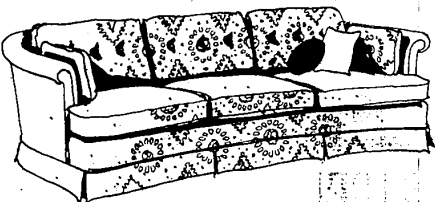
FARMINGTON A series of five classes on diabetes will be held Thursday afternoons from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. in the Oakland County Health Department, 27725 Greenfield, Southfield. The classes will begin Feb. 19.

The classes are sponsored by the health department and will be taught by experienced public health nurses and department nutritionist, Mrs. Kay Claus. The content includes the nature of the disease, dietary management, medications and suggestions for coping with everyday problems.

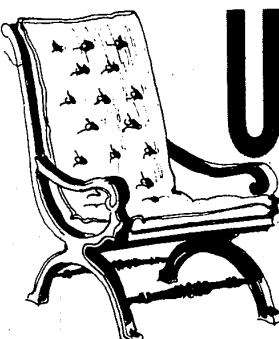
Those attending must have diabetes or have a family member who has the disease and be under the care of a doctor. A written statement from the doctor is required for attending and can be presented at the first class.
