CPR provides artificial circulation and respiration for a person whose beart and lungs have ceased functioni, due to a heart attack, sl. 'k or other causes.

 External cardiac compressions and mouth-to-mouth resuscitation are al-ternated to simulate the heart and lungs in order to save the victim's life.
 The course was divided into two sec-tions. The students first attended a lec-ture session in which they learned the

class to train students," said Harry Stonehouse, MSU geology professor and program coordinator.
"This is the first time a class as large as this one has been offered on Stonehouse and Dr. Dave Druz, a Lanting-area physician, decided to start the CPR training program this year as a public service to the community.
