

# Brother Rice overcomes Gallagher, 70-58

The early Central Division cage showdown it set — and it takes no genius to figure out the participants.

Birmingham Brother Rice and Detroit Catholic Central clash at 8 p.m. tomorrow night in Redford for early control in the Catholic League conference race.

The Warriors, ranked No. 1 in Oakland County by the Observer & Eccentric, raised their record to 7-0 overall and 2-0 in the Central Division with a 70-58 triumph over Harper Woods Bishop Gallagher Friday night. CC, meanwhile battered Harper Woods

Notre Dame, 91-81, for a 6-1 overall mark but an identical 2-0 record. Brother Rice led from the start jumping out to a 19-11 first-quarter advantage at the Warrior gym.

Four Rice players reached double figures. John Shasky, a 6-foot-10 junior center, led the Warriors with 20 points, nine rebounds and five steals. Junior Paul Jokisch, standing 6-7, added 17 points and six assists. Les Dagg, a senior transfer guard from U-D, scored 13 points and had seven assists, while Dennis Kosak came off the bench to

register 11 points and six assists. Gallagher's 6-4 guard Ken Kozlowski took home game honors with 24 points.

The Warriors shot a hefty 51 percent from the floor (38 of 75), while Gallagher hit only 30 percent (18-58). Rick IV defeated Gallagher JV, 68-58, in the preliminary game.

The Oakland University women's basketball team snapped a three-game losing streak by defeating Michigan Tech 64-64 in a Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) game last week.

The Pioneers, 4-4 overall and 2-0 in league play, received 14 points from sophomore guard Anne Kish. The Pontiac High School graduate hit seven of her 10 shots from the field.

Freshman reserve Pam Springer and sophomore forward Linda Krawford were also in

double figures for OU with 11 and 10 points respectively.

OU's defense was the story of the game, allowing the Huskies to shoot only 15-25 from the field for a meager 33.9 percent. The Pioneers enjoyed a 38-19 lead at halftime, which permitted OU coach Dewayne Jones to use his bench frequently in the second half.

The Pioneers will host Ferris State College 5 p.m. Thursday.

MICHIGAN TECH'S Geof Kotila scored 32 points and grabbed 13 rebounds to lead the Huskies to a 92-86 victory over Oakland's men's

basketball team last week.
