"We have seven regional offices, and I have a regional manager in each of

ice responsible for community development and re-development. We have a woman in the Detroit office, Marya Sieminski, who is statewide coordinator of economic development and who assists those regional managers."

(Riegle shifted his suburban office, effective today, from Livonia to 30115 Greenfield, between 12 and 13 Mile roads, Southfield, calling it more centrally located and accessible.)

"We've been intimately involved in working with all local units of government to find every working connection

we can with federal programs and put combinations together to make things happen. There are dozens, hundreds, of projects."

"At the same time, I've gone on the domestic policy committees that relate to these areas. I'm on Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs Committee; on the Budget Committee; on the Commerce (subcommittee of Science and Technology); on the Labor Committee."

ON BANKING, Riegle claimed credit for getting Michigan 8 percent of the

Urban Development Action Grant money although the state has 4 percent of the population. He put total public and private investment at nearly \$1 billion. Much of that money has gone to such

older industrial cities as Detroit, Pontiac, Hazel Park, Port Huron, Flint, Saginaw, Bay City, Battle Creek, Grand Rapids, Muskegon, Benton Harbor and Ionia.

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills held a regular meeting January 12, 1981. Mayor Wolf opened the meeting at 7:30 o'clock P.M. Members present were Wolf, Sorrento, Burwell, Lange, Oppenheimer, Alkateb, and Dolan. Others present were City Manager Savage, Acting City Clerk Thomas and City Attorney Bibeau. Council approved the December 8 and December 15, 1980 with corrections and January 5, 1981 minutes.

Mr. Savage introduced the Assistant City Manager, Bill Costick.

Council adopted a resolution urging tax reform.

Council reaffirmed their support of the proposed widening of Orchard Lake road south of I-695.

Zoning map amendment C62-235 was enacted rezoning 23-3-227-013 & 014 from RA-3 to Sp-3 in section 34 west of Orchard Lake between Freedom and Nine Mile Road.

Zoning map amendment C62-235 was enacted rezoning 23-21-101-037 and 038 from RA-2 to OS-1 in section 21 east side of Drake Road, south of Independence Hills Subdivision.

Zoning map amendment C62-236 was enacted rezoning 23-3-476-019, 027 and 029 from RA-1 to OS-1 located in Section 3, Oaklands Subdivision.

Zoning map amendment C62-237 was enacted rezoning 23-11-101-037 and 038 from RA-2 to OS-1 in section 11, lot 76 of the Oakland Hills Orchards.

The liability arrangements as presented with Oakland Community College relative to planned fitness trail was approved.

Special assessment district for sewer improvement and water improvement were established for Rock Ridge Lane in Franklin Oaks Subdivision.

Approval was given the request from Melvin B. Rosenhaus for a new full year Class C license to be located at 31740 Fourteen Mile, to be amended to Farmington Hills Restaurant Association, a Michigan Limited Partnership, and R & S Tavern Corporation, a Michigan corporation, and to amend the location of 31205 Orchard Lake Road, as per prior approval on August 6, 1979.

Council approved the Resolution for Nine Mile Road Water Payback Agreement.

One year extension of employment for Heiko Thiem, Heating and Refrigeration Inspector was granted.

Request from Chatsford Building Company for an extension of the Park completion date for Barbizon Estates Subdivision set for November 30, 1981 was approved.

Approval was given to McGowan Deferred Loan Agreement for sewer connection and service line.

CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order at 8:00 p.m. January 5, 1981 by Mayor William S. Hartsock.

PRESENT: Mayor Hartsock, Councilmen Bennett, Buckler, Tupper and Yoder.

ABSENT: None.

CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT: City Mgr. Deadman, Dir. Billing, Dir. Selfert, Clerk Viane.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

The minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

Council authorized the application to close Grand River Avenue for the Memorial Day Parade on May 25, 1981.

City Mgr. Deadman advised Council of a Public Hearing on Wednesday, January 21, 1981 at 2:30 p.m. regarding proposed increases in average disposal rates and charges by the City of Detroit Water & Sewerage Department, at the Water Board Building. Proclamation was issued designating January 24-31, 1981 as Junior Achievement Week.

Council accepted the recommendations of Merritt & McCallum, Architects, and authorized preparation of plans and specifications for repairs to the Municipal Building mechanical systems. City Clerk was authorized to receive bids.

The City Manager and the City Clerk were authorized to enter into a four-year land contract with Mr. William Slocum for the purchase of Lots 7 and 8, Fred M. Warner's Addition.

Council authorized the City Engineer to develop specifications for the replacement of the Twin Valley Sewer Lift Station and the City Clerk to receive bids for a duplex submersible pump station with grinder pump.

Council approved the proposed changes in Farmington's portion of the Master Right-of-Way Plan for Oakland County.

Council approved entering into a one year contract with Oakland County Road Commissioners for the maintenance of Farmington Road from Eight Mile north to Grand River, effective January 1, 1981.

The bid of James-Marlin Chevrolet, Inc. was accepted for one Station Wagon-type Patrol Vehicle.

Resolution was adopted recognizing Community Living Centers, Inc. as a non-profit organization.

Public comments were heard.

Council approved adding the name of Judge Max Hulett to the city's Memorial Board in the Council Chambers.

The monthly bills were approved for payment.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:30 p.m.
