Lutherans, Catholics join for 'Unity' series

The congregations of Bethlehem Lutheran and St. Gerald Catholic Churches join to sponsor a four-part series called "Christian Unity" that begins at 7:30 p.m. Monday, Jan. 19, and continues on Monday evenings.

All sessions will be given in Bethlehem Lutheran Church, 35300 Eight Mile Road, and all are open to all members of the community.

A film strip, called "To Grow in Uni-

ty," will be shown at the first meeting, which sets the tone for common reflection in the spirit of unity, and explores the faith the denominations share while facing their differences and overcoming old stereotypes.

A question-and-answer period and refreshments will follow each presentation. Pre-registration is not necessary.

Class will aid those adjusting to divorce

Rebouncing from divorce need not be an overwhelming experience according to Keith Levick, a clinical social worker, who will be leading a new Farmington Community Center class, "Adjustment to Divorce."

"Divorce is a complex social phenomenon as well as a complex personal experience," says Levick. "On a social level, all divorced persons suffer because their community is altered. Friends take a different view of a person, and in many instances the divorcee perceives this as ostracism and disapproval."

Levick adds that the complexity of divorce arises because a series of events are happening all at once. It is painful and puzzling for many couples.

"When the individual is better equipped with the understanding of what he or she will experience in a di-

vorice, the adjustment period will most likely be less traumatic," he says. The class will meet from 7:30-9:30 p.m. on Thursdays, beginning Jan. 15 for six sessions. Fee is \$30 per person.

In class, Levick will deal with the subject on many levels including: emotional divorce (problems before the legal divorce); the legal divorce (based on grounds); the economic divorce (money and property); the co-parental divorce (custody and visitation); social divorce (changes in friends and community); and psychological divorce (separation anxiety and autonomy).

Levick has been in private practice for three years and has taught at Schoolcraft Community College, in Livonia Community Schools and the Jewish Community Center.

His mother said the experience spurred on his determination to become a veterinarian.
