Alameda school targeted to close

1959. The district received \$332,000 for Highmeadow Elementary School, closed last June. It was bought by the Lutheran School Association and converted to Lutheran High Northwest. Bond School, closed in 1974, also was sold last year to an office developer for \$340,000.
"It's doubtful that Alameda will be sold," said Lewis Schulman, superintendent of schools.
"It may be kept for school or com-

munity use. There are many possibilities. We've had inquiries from private schools. There are also needs for the district to accommodate, such as special education.
"It won't be boarded and left as an eyesore for the community."
The school board will vote on the Alameda closing Feb. 3.
"Enrollment is dropping with regularity," Schulman said. "Elementary enrollment will drop by more than 300 students next year."

One local official opposed to the bills was Michael Shipce, a trustee of the Farmington school board and a legislative aid to Rep. David Hollister, D-Lansing, who asked Milliken for a veto. Residents win rezoning battle

Presently, Farmington Hills is serviced by two major chain supermarkets — one at 13 Mile and Orchard Lake Road and the other at 12 Mile and Middlebelt.
To survive, a supermarket must gross at least \$12 million annually, according to Bernie May, a Frankel representative. Because of the scarcity of supermarkets and projected increases in population and cost of gasoline, a supermarket on this site would economically thrive, he said.
THE PROJECT was supported by members of the city's Economic Development Corporation which had vowed

to aid Frankel in acquiring low interest loans.
Since its inception, the shopping center proposal has been the center of controversy. At one point the Planning Commission had recommended the city council reject the rezoning.
But after last year's election two new members, Robert Anzovari and Joe Hovanessian, were appointed to fill commission vacancies. They tilted the commission's recommendation in favor of the project.
Planning Commissioner Shirley Stadler was one member who opposed the rezoning. She addressed city council.
"We do need another supermarket.

But this proposal isn't a better or a right alternative," she said.
"Tonight is the last chance to set the character of a major mile road," she said.
Mrs. Dolan agreed.
"The shopping centers we have are suburban blight and I just don't want anymore suburban blight," she said.
Alkaateb defended the proposal, saying it was an error to stick with the letter of the master plan which designated the area for residential development.
"Master plans are made to be flexible. If not, we wouldn't have the industrial parks or other developments. It is necessary blight," he said.
