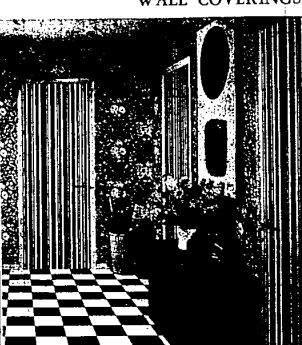

"Woman Power—New Dimension in Social Evolution" will be led by Dr. Ronald Lippitt and Dr. Eva Schindler-Rainman and will examine the changing role of women and its effect on relationships with men and with children.

Some of the questions it will answer include: What are the implications of the "contraceptive revolution"? What are the unique resources of women? Will there be a single sex standard?

The residential session, which begins Friday evening, is for professionals and volunteers from education, church, recreation, health and welfare agencies.

Dr. Lippitt, author of "The Dynamics of Planned Change," is professor of psychology and sociology at the University of Michigan and program director for the Center for Research on the Utilization of Scientific Knowledge.

It's Happy 69th For Army Nurses

The United States Army Nurse Corps, the oldest military nurse corps in the world, observes its 69th anniversary during February.

The mission of the all-officer corps remains the same as at its founding in February 1901—to provide the best possible nursing care for military personnel and their families during both war and peace. It has a proud history of selfless and distinctive service by its members throughout World Wars I and II, the Korean action and, the present Vietnam conflict.

Established as a result of the devoted efforts of civilian nurses employed by the Army to care for the wounded and sick during the Spanish-American War, the Army Nurse Corps was composed entirely of women until 1955, when it began accepting qualified male nurses. Today about 20% of the Army nurses on active duty are men.

From a membership of 403 when the United States entered World War I in 1917, the Army Nurse Corps expanded to a membership of 21,480 within 19 months.

During World War II, the Corps increased in strength from 625 officers—at the outbreak of hostilities in Europe in 1939—to over 57,000 nurses on duty in 1,000 Army hospitals and installations around the world by 1945. Sixteen lost their lives as a result of enemy action. Sixty-six were taken prisoner by the Japanese and more than 1,400 were decorated for bravery under fire or for meritorious service.

Army nurses also have supported combat operations in Korea and now in South Vietnam.

The Army Nurse Corps, with its history of service to our fighting men and their families, richly deserves the tribute of all Americans on the occasion of its 69th anniversary.

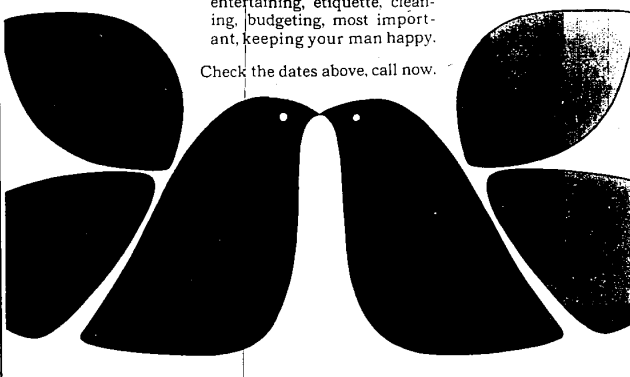
