Army Pvt. Robert B. Butler is assigned to Company C, 17th Battalion, 5th Brigade, in the United States Army Training Center, Armor (USATC), at Ft. Knox.

He will spend the next two months learning the fundamental skills of live ammunition under simulated combat situations, learning protective measures and first-aid for chemical, biological and radiological attacks, as well as being schooled in the use of modern arms.

Following the completion of basic training, Butler, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert H. Butler of 26317 Greythorne, Farmington, will receive at least an additional eight weeks of either advanced instruction or on-the-job training to qualify him in a specialized military skill.
