

OLSM rips Mt. Carmel

Can you believe 61 points in one quarter?
That's what happened Tuesday night when Wyandotte Mt. Carmel outscored Catholic League basketball rival Orchard Lake St. Mary's, 52-26, in the final quarter.
The Eagles got the last laugh, however, winning the game, 72-57, to raise their league record to 6-0.
St. Mary's held a 9-6 first-quarter advantage and outscored Mt. Carmel, 15-2, in the second period. The Eagles followed with a 22-14 third-quarter spurt to gain control before the explosive finish.

Southfield High School upset archrival Southfield-Lathrup in a non-league basketball game, 72-61, Tuesday night at the Southfield gym.

The difference was the middle two quarters where the Blue Jays outscored the Chargers, 40-29. Southfield also had a balanced scoring attack as five players reached double figures.

"I knew it would be a close game, and I didn't think they'd blow us out," said Southfield coach Greg Sliwka.

"The rebounding and balanced scoring made the difference for us."

Southfield, which outscored the quicker Chargers 35-25, was led by Mike McCaskill. The 6-foot sophomore guard had 14 points, eight rebounds, two blocked shots and four assists.

"I don't even play him" (McCaskill) that much, I'd say he's on the floor about half the time," said Sliwka, whose team is now 6-5 overall.

Other Blue Jays in double figures included Ed Murren and Jerome Walker with 12 each, Rick Ziegler with 11 and Darryl Darden with 10.

Lathrup's offense centered around Paul Bobbitt's 28 points.

Southfield's junior varsity won, 56-48.

City Manager Deadman reported on results of study and recommendations for traffic control at Maple and Cloverdale Streets.

A resolution was adopted amending the 1980-81 Community Development Program to include money for housing rehabilitation.

Council authorized a budget adjustment in the 1980-81 General Fund Budget to provide for a Historical Museum Account.

City Manager Deadman reported on the 1981 property assessments.

Council authorized the Mayor to sign a Notice of Intent to continue under the State Construction Code operations.

Payment in the amount of \$85,399.20 was authorized to Gerry DiPonio & Sons, Inc. for work completed on the Water Improvement Project.

Payment in the amount of \$16,912.89 was authorized to McCarthy Contracting Company for work completed in the 1980 Road Improvement Program.

The Financial Reports for the 6 months ended December 31, 1980 for the General Fund and the 47th District Court were received and filed.

A Resolution was adopted in Memoriam for Joseph G. DeVriendt.

The monthly bills were approved for payment.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY COUNCIL MEETING JANUARY 26, 1981

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills held a regular meeting January 26, 1981. Mayor Wolf opened the meeting at 7:30 o'clock P.M. Members present were Burwell, Sonnen, Oppenheimer, Alkateb, Lange and Dolan. Others present were City Manager Savage, Deputy City Clerk Thomas, Assistant City Manager Costick and City Attorney Bibeau.

Council approved the January 12, 1981 regular meeting City Council Minutes.

C22-A(2) Zoning amendment to amend the text of the Zoning Ordinance by amending the text of Article XV A - Industrial Research Office District, section 1500A. Preamble, to delete certain references to the area of the City which is intended to be used for Industrial Research Office District classification was denied.

February 17, 1981 was set for cost hearing date for sewer and water improvement on Hathaway Street, Special Assessment District C151 and C150.

Council approved the recommendation of the City Manager to award bids through the County bid process for the purchase of ten Police cars waiving the bid process.

Towing services required by the Police Department was awarded to Lucas/Livonia, their bid being low and authorize the proper City Officials to execute the contract.

Council approved the hiring of a relative for a CETA employee in special crime prevention project.

Approval was given the cost for the aerial topographic surveys by Council resolution at \$15.00 per sheet.

Council approved the agreement with Michigan Department of Transportation for surface drainage facility on Northwestern in the amount of \$1,067,500 and authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute the agreement.

Approval was given the following Traffic Control Orders: 1.C.31.8 wherein all southbound Tralee Trail traffic shall yield at the intersection of Rhinwood Drive, 1.B.31.1 wherein all southbound Woodfarm Drive traffic shall stop at the intersection of Rhinwood Drive, 1.C.28.29 requiring that all north and southbound Hamilton Avenue traffic shall yield at the intersection of Independence Avenue, 1.B.35.5 requiring that all north and southbound Jefferson Avenue traffic shall stop at the intersection of Independence Avenue, 1.C.26.30 requiring that all north and southbound Roosevelt Avenue traffic shall yield at the intersection of Independence Avenue, 1.C.26.31 requiring that all north and southbound Wheeler Avenue traffic shall yield at the intersection of Independence Avenue.

Council rescinded Traffic Control Order 2.E.22.89 as adopted in accordance with the resolution adopted by Oakland County rescinding their Traffic Control Order No. TP 53-6-24-80 prohibiting left and right turns on Orchard Lake Road and Fourteen Mile Road.

Council rescinded Traffic Control Order No. 2.E.21.89 as adopted in accordance with the resolution adopted by Oakland County rescinding their Traffic Control Order No. TP 54-6-80 prohibiting left and right turns on Orchard Lake Road and Thirteen Mile Road.

Approval was given the proposed resolution - Fair Elimination of Federal Estate Tax.

Council requested a Public Hearing for C62-238 in the SW 1/4 of Section 23, corner of Eleven Mile and Orchard Lake Road.

Council requested a Public Hearing re changing the street name Pink to Eldon.

Upon motion meeting adjourned.
