the staffs of both hospitals, he said. Botsford has no intention of reducing staffs on that basis, he said. Any possible reduction in administrative staff caused by joint operations would be solved through attrition, he added.

ROBERT LAIBLE, Redford Community administrator, said discussions of the combining of the hospitals was too preliminary for comment at this time.

If Redford's Board of Directors agrees to the combination, Botsford would have to get approval of a certificate of need from the Comprehensive Health Planning Council of Southeastern Michigan (CHIPs).

That organization also is responsible for directing a new plan for reduction of excess hospital capacity under guidelines developed by the Joint Leguialative Committee created in response to the excess hospital capacity issue.


