

# Milliken: Growth key to better life

Here is the text of Gov. Milliken's recent *State of the State* message as it relates to community development and local government issues.

Michigan needs growth and sound economic development for better lives for our residents, physically improved communities, fiscally sound governments, more jobs and increased social harmony.

Unfortunately, in cities, villages and townships, haphazard growth and duplicate development have eroded tax bases, driven up the costs of housing and threatened the future of neighborhoods, businesses and public buildings.

My community development goals are intended to improve the condition of developed areas, preserve essential land, conserve neighborhoods and assist local government. One of the first tasks has been to end state policies and programs which contribute to inefficient growth.

The Community Development Cabinet, formed in 1979 and chaired by the Lieutenant Governor, works to assure that my community development objectives are considered in decisions by state agencies. In December, I asked department directors to develop impact assessment procedures and to incorporate community development

goals into all departmental decision-making.

The Community Development Cabinet, will monitor the progress of these assessments.

#### Consolidation of Community Development Activities

In November, I issued an executive order assigning certain community development activities to the Department of Commerce to assure that state fiscal, regulatory and spending policies promote sound economic and community development.

Transferred to the department were the Office of Intergovernmental Relations, Boundary Commission and the Michigan State Housing Development Authority. The department also was assigned responsibility for overseeing subdivision control, county zoning regulations and state aid to cities.

These new responsibilities will complement the activities of other Commerce Department units, such as the Office of Economic Development, Travel Bureau, Job Development Authority, Public Service Commission and the Financial Institutions Bureau.

By including the Michigan Environmental Review Board (MERB) in the department, we will be assured that significant construction projects are

secondary on the environment. Moreover, proximity will encourage earlier MERB involvement that will strengthen its coordination role and help avoid costly delays.

#### Improving Conditions of Developed Areas

Sound community development requires maintaining, rebuilding and upgrading developed areas. I am directing the Commerce Department to develop a state capital investment plan to aid distressed communities and promote the use of developed areas.

I have directed that, whenever possible, state offices be located in the downtown areas of Michigan's cities and villages. This will help stimulate the economy of those areas, better serve the public and reduce costs of providing state services. I have directed the departments of Commerce and Management and Budget to develop a site selection procedure to implement this policy.

The Cabinet and the Department of Commerce will explore an urban jobs tax credit program to encourage job creation in urban areas and urban revitalization. I urge legislative support of this issue.

#### Strengthening Local Governments

Another community development objective is to strengthen local governments.

For instance, many local zoning ordinances were written when growth and community needs were different than now. They may hamper cities and townships in pursuing development in the 1980s. I have asked the Commerce Department to develop a program to assist communities wishing to update local zoning ordinances.

Last year, I recommended \$40 million for fiscal assistance to distressed communities based on tax effort, percent of families below the poverty level, percent of elderly, income growth and declining population. I regret that the Legislature failed to adopt enabling legislation during the last session. I hope the Legislature will give this program priority in 1981. We cannot afford to ignore the financial needs of areas of high unemployment and economic distress.
