Since 1975, he has been chair of the state Democratic party's finance committee. He was legislative counsel for the late Son. Philip Hart in 1974 and 1975. firm in Oakland An Oakland County manufacturer will be able to hire 15 more workers with a a \$700,000 Job Devel-opmert Authority loan. Gov. William Milliken said the loan will enable the New Hudson Corp. of New Hudson to finance an expansion of its facilities in New Hudson and Mil-tord Townshi

expansion of its facilities in New Hudson and Mil-ford Township. Officials of the corporation said the expansion – including construction of a 16,000 square-foot-building in Milford Township and the purchase of new machinery and equipment – will result in the hiring of 15 production workers after it is complet-ed this summer.

The firm manufactures industrial rolls used in the production and processing of steel, aluminum, paper, plastic and other sheet products. The ioan was approved by the Job Development Autiority (JOA), an agency of the Michigan Depart-ment of Commerce. JDA is empowered to sell tax-exempt bonds and loan the proceeds to Michigan business to help innance new plants, machinery, additions to facili-ties or pollution control equipment. It operates by taking advantage of federal regulations that allow public bodies to sell tax-exempt bonds in the pri-vate market. The bonds do not constitute a debt of Michigan taxpayers.
