"The class is listed in the center's brochure for children 8 and up but it is really an appealing art form for all ages," Mrs. Ohno said.

"It has a Buddist origin that I remember most as being comected with funeral rites. Relatives and friends of the deceased would make paper clothes, cars, food, furniture, anything they thought could be used in the next world out of paper. These were burned as part of the ceremony."
