## Origami: An art form for all ages

Origami, the paper-folding art from Japan, will be taught in a morning workshop, Saturday, March 28, by Theresa Ohna in Farmington Community Center.

"The class is listed in the center's brochure for children 8 and up, but it is really an appealing art form for all ages," Mrs. Ohna said.

"It has a Buddhist origin that I remember most as being connected with funeral rites. Relatives and friends of the deceased would make paper clothes, cars, food, furniture, anything they thought could be used in the next world out of paper. These were burned as part of the ceremony."

She said that in her teachings, lectures and demonstrations of origami, one high school class, in Plymouth, used it to make Christmas ornaments, "which was quite a long way from the Buddhist origin."

One of her own memories as a young student in Japanese schools was making birds.

"These were attached to a string and sent to a sick friend. The bird would carry away the illness and your friend would be restored to health," she said.

**DURING THE Saturday workshop,** Mrs. Ohna will give the basics of origami, with projects ranging from the simplest of realistic objects to complex abstract forms.

She will teach the participants how to make three-dimensional figures cre-

ated from paper.

"Lying flat, they don't have any resemblance at all to what they look like when they're blown up," she said. "Then, they take the shape of birds or

animals or an entirely different geometric figure than what you might imagine."

The one session workshop meets from 10-11:30 a.m. Fee is \$4.50. In-person

registration is necessary in the center at 24705 Farmington Road. Business hours are from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. weekdays; from 9 a.m.-noon on Saturdays.

## Champion chorus calls new Sweet Adelines

Farmington resident Jerilee McHard will be greeting the guests when Great Lakes Chapter of Sweet Adelines stages its "New Member Guest Night" at 7:30 p.m. March 3 in Sterling Heights' Henry Ford II High School.

Mrs. McHard, who sings baritone with the women barbershoppers, is a promoter as well as a member of the chapter that has won its fourth regional championship.

Great Lakes goes into international competition in Phoenix, Ariz., this fall. "Any new members who want to visit Phoenix with us can come out to meet us on guest night," said Linda Shaffer, spokeswoman for the 65-member group. "Mrs. McHard travels all the way from Farmington to rehearsals every week, and we have many members who travel the same distance."

Membership is achieved through audition to demonstrate that the singer can sing her part against three others and sing in tune.

"A KNOWLEDGE of music theory is not required," Ms. Shaffer said. "Neither is a familiarity with barbershopping. We hold music schools and workshops, frequently to teach Sweet Adelines about the art and about better singing."

The chapter gives both public and private performances. It stages shows for fund-raisers and keeps competing to "keep sharp and innovative," Ms. Shaffer said.

Great Lakes Chapter is directed by Carl Dahlke.

The international organization numbers about 33,000 Sweet Adelines in 720 chapters.

The chorus rehearses every Tuesday in Henry Ford II High School, located at 11911 Clinton River Road, Sterling Heights.
