Yes, the complainer has a point: We are bombarded by issues too big for us. My an-swer is to find a bite-size morsel and start chewing.

We are easily overwhelmed by such a massive concern as the International Year of the Disabled. Apathy includes the rational-ization that it is not our problem to build ramps, widen doors, improve restrooms and designate parking space for the handicapped.

Specific problems of specific friends move me into awareness of responsibility toward the disabled. One of the least noticed disabilities is hearing loss. And there are things most of us can do quite simply.

MORE THAN 15 percent of Americans have hearing problems serious enough to require assistance. A few are helped by surgery. Less than 2 percent of those with serious loss actually wear hearing aids. Taking notice of even those few would motivate new

Professionals, called audiologists, find the number of people with hearing problems is


increasing each year. Furthermore, the age of those in trouble is steadily lowering. The major reason is damage from loud music. One is tempted to go around asking if there was music before there was electricity.

One helpful thing we can do is join the effort to lower the volume of the electronic music equipment in our homes and places of entertainment. Persistence is required but repeated requests usually get response.

A second step is to cut down the clatter. A second step is to the down the clatter. People with hearing aids are perplexed be-cause the rest of us don't know some sounds cause pain. Part of the problem is volume, part is audio frequency, and part is just the din created by the array of noises.

AND WE MIGHT help sensitize men who wear facial hair. Unless it is well trimmed, a moustache .virtually prevents lip reading. Some of us are hard to understand at best so we don't want any extra obstacles.

Most of us are aided by lip reading without even knowing it. A few profoundly deaf are taught lip reading, but most with hearing loss just learn it on their own. Observe friends listening to a speech or just trying to keep up with a conversation. It is astounding



to see how much some people maneuver to use eyes to aid hearing.

When I talk to public speakers about re-sponsibility to lip readers, they say they nev-er knew. Awareness is most of the way home in this game. Some can trim facial hair but all of us can participate in increasing sensi-tivity.

Hearing-impaired people want to enjoy sounds and words often denied them. Involvement in this one problem can propel us into participation in other aspects of the Year of the Disabled. The disabled don't want indifferent pity. They want simple assistance in functioning in the normal activities of society.
