Southfield High School defeated Bloomfield Hills Andover by eight points, 54-46, in a Southeastern Michigan Association (SMA) basketball game Tuesday night.

The difference in this game was an 18-10 second-quarter spurt by the Blue Jays.

"We just stuck to our guns and applied full-court pressure all the way," said Southfield coach Greg Sliwka.

Southfield's senior forward Darryl Darden led his team in scoring with a dozen points. Sophomore forward Mike McCasill added 10.

Andover's Eric Girdler, a guard, had 18 points, and Bill Ammerman added 14. Robin Peterson, Andover's leading scorer this season, was held scoreless in the first half and mustered just eight points.

The Blue Jays will play at Berkley tomorrow. Southfield, ranked No. 4 by the Observer & Eccentric, is 13-6 overall, 9-4 in the league. Andover is 8-11 overall, 6-7 in the SMA. The Barons will host Troy tomorrow.

Al Morris, West Bloomfield's leading scorer this season, connected for a free throw with 15 seconds left to put the Lakers ahead, 52-51. Teammate Tom Hall made a free throw with three seconds left to account for the two-point difference.

The Lakers were aided by some fine shooting, as they made 17 of 32 shots for a 53 percent average. Meanwhile, the Chargers made 17 of 47 (36 percent).

Lathrup, second in the Metro Suburban Activities Association (MSAA) behind highly regarded Royal Oak Dondero, is now 13-5 overall. The Chargers,

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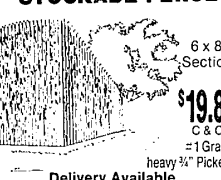
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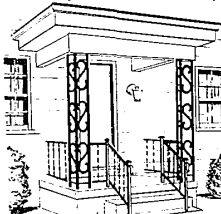


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
