

# Tanenbaum Is Final Lecturer

Rabbi Marc Tanenbaum, who has been characterized as "the leading figure among Jewish ecumenists" in the fields of social action, inter-religious, interracial, and international affairs, will conclude the Jewish-Christian Lecture Series in Blessed Sacrament Cathedral, 9844 Woodward at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 25.

National director of inter-religious affairs for the American Jewish Committee, he is frequently consulted by both Protestant and Catholic leaders.

Rabbi Tanenbaum was a founder of the historic National Conference on Race and Religion, regarded by many as the breakthrough in the mobilization of religious forces in the civil rights struggle.

He was the only participating rabbi in Rome at the time of Vatican II's vote on the Declaration on the Jews, repudiating anti-Semitism. He organized American Jewish Relief for Nigeria and Biafra in cooperation with Church World Service and Catholic Relief Services. His book "Our Moral and Spiritual Resources for International Cooperation" was edited by Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr but is one of his many public writings.

He has served on various United Nations and UNESCO committees. In addition, he has achieved national prominence as vice-chairman of the White House conference on children and youth, the White House conference on aging, and the President's Advisory Committee on equal employment opportunity. As a member of the White House conference on religious leaders on race, and numerous other positions with the United States government.
