FHS Singers Warble Their Way To Top Rating

FARMINGTON—Falconaires and Twelve Tones from Farmington High School each received superior ratings at the annual Michigan School Vocal Association's District 11 solo and ensemble festival Feb. 7 in Oak Park High School.

Superior ratings were also received by soloists Roberta Pauline, Christine Cook, Lorraine Manz and a trio composed of Roberta Pauline, Christine Cook, and Gail Halava.

EXCELLENT RATINGS were won by Ann Doolittle, Gail Halava, Christa Tesner, Bill Bishop, Cindy Strey and Debby Watson for their solo performances.

The district festival requires vocal directors to bring their select singing groups and any

students who are studying voice privately to perform before a certified adjudicator for judging and grading. Judges are carefully selected from college and university vocal departments throughout the state.

Those receiving superior ratings are now eligible to participate in the state festival to be held March 31.

Vocal director William Feucht expressed satisfaction with the district ratings. "It is very unusual for any school to be awarded 50% superior and 50% excellent marks," he commented.

REACTIONS of participants were varied. "I was petrified; my knees were shaking," said sophomore Ann Doolittle.

Lorraine Manz remarked,

"It was the scariest thing I've ever done," while Chris Cook's comment was "When I saw my One rating, I knew it was worth all the work."

Roberta Pauline admitted, "I love singing for people. I knew I had to do my best so I could go on to the state festival."

Cindy Strey acknowledged, "It made me aware of things I'm doing wrong."

Debby Watson explained how she manages to control her nerves. "It's easier if you try to communicate with your audience—you don't get nervous that way."

Summing up her feelings about the festival, Gail Halava said, "It was too early to get up on a Saturday, but it was fun."

Dial This Weekend Drug Rap Line Continuing

FARMINGTON Dial 626-2266. This is the phone number for "Drug Rap Line."

Drug Rap Line began service last weekend in Farmington.

It is unique. It is designed for youth in trouble with drugs, kids in a crisis situation.

THE OPERATION is simple but potent. A boy and girl who has freaked out, flipped on LSD, pot, speed, any of it, may call Drug Rap Line and talk to another kid trained by a psychol-

ogist to handle any drug emergency. The boy or girl answering the phone can talk for hours if necessary in an emergency situation, or a referral can be made to a couple of doctors who have volunteered services.

Last weekend, the first of Drug Rap Line's operation, was highly successful.

True there were some investigatory phone calls.

But three were from scared kids. One young counselor talked to a boy high on LSD for 15 minutes. The youth's grand-

mother called him to do something and he didn't think he could.

His counselor advised him to say he was sick and then call Rap Line back if he had further trouble. He didn't call back so the assumption was he was talked down.

BECAUSE OF the success of the first weekend, the six to eight young counselors manning the Rap Line phone have decided to work every school day from school closing time till 8 p.m.

Adult forces are mobilizing around the young counselors.

The head nurse at Royal Oak's Beaumont Hospital heard about them and has offered her help. She has experience with drug problems and has been with a psychiatric nurse.



Detroit Lawyer Arrested Here

FARMINGTON—A Detroit attorney and a former client, a defendant against a kidnapping complaint, have been charged in Farmington District Court with obstructing justice.

The pair was also charged with conspiring to obstruct justice.

John A. Mazer of Detroit and Daniel Patrick of Wayne were arraigned this week by District Judge Michael Hand. Mazer was released on \$1,000 bond and Patrick is out on \$10,000 bond in connection with the kidnapping charge.

Warrants for the arrest of the pair allege they attempted to influence a witness in the case of the alleged kidnapping.

Patrick, Glen Graves of Wyandotte and Miss Janet Conklin of Wayne are awaiting pretrial examination on charges of kidnapping. Patrick is also charged with felonious assault and carrying a concealed weapon and Graves with felonious assault.

Mazer and Patrick supposedly attempted to influence Patrick Bradley of Farmington, the youth allegedly kidnapped by Patrick, Graves and Miss Conklin, not to talk with police about the incident.

Celebration Plans Rally

Bicycle skill contests and a 50-mile bicycle race will be held June 13 on the Oakland county courthouse parking lot, 1200 N. Telegraph Rd.

A Saturday night banquet and rock and roll band program is scheduled for Waterford-Oaks activity center, June 14, the American Youth Hostels members will place their canoes in the Clinton River and compete in various burling-type competitions.
