Two years ago, Larsen was the only candidate for the state chairmanship and won by acclamation. But things didn't go quite so easily for the former state legislator and Pontiac high school football coach this time.

Larsen decisively staved off a conservative-led movement for control of the party chairmanship, garnering a comfortable 66 percent of the vote against Harry C. Veryser is chairman of the Michigan Conservative Union

SUBURBAN Republicans will be seeing plenty of new faces following the weekend's results for congressional district chairmanships.

State Rep. Kirby Holmes (Utica), a conservative, was elected chairman of the 12th Article Chairman of the Schoolcraft College board, remains hairman of the 2nd District, in northwestern Wayne County, eastern washed and Monroe counties.

Patricia Ganzberger of Southgate now heads the 15th District delegation.

Frank Vallotin, a Redford Township Republican who prefers to be called a "strong moderate" rather than a conservative, unseated incumbent Detroit attorney Edward Haroutunian for the chairmanship of the 17th District. The district includes Farmington and Alan May of Bloomfield Hills now heads the 19th District delegation.

Of the area's six districts, only Greenleal's 2nd District retained its incumbent chairman.

CONSERVATIVES may not have taken the whole ball of wax, but they did have some things to cheer about. Vallotin's victory seems to have been one of them.

"I won because I appealed to the broader base in the political spectrum in the 17th District," Vallotin said. "The Reagan people will work with me, and the facts are they wouldn't work with Haroutunian because he bucked them during the last campaign."

Still to come in the biennial GOP spring housecleaning are new holders for the offices of secretary, treasurer, and subcommittee chairs and vice chairs. Those posts will be filled April 3-4 at the first meeting of the party's new state central committee, itself elected last weekend.

"We are experiencing a migration of some business and jobs to the Sun Belt. Automation has replaced other jobs. Both factors combine to intensify the importance of diversification of indus-try and employment in our state," he said.

said. MUCH OF the job loss is due to competition from Japan, he said, noting that "Japan involves all aspects of its society in a planning process—management, labor, education and government at all levels. "In the U.S., however, these groups take it to be their task in life to fight one another."

In competing for industry, Pursell said Michigan, the northeast states and the Midwest should not get into a "donnybrook" with be South and West.


