Old newspapers needed

Area residents are asked to be reminded to place their bundled and bagged newspapers in the receptacle marked for this purpose on the far end of the Farmington Hills Police Department's parking lot, in the city hall complex on 11 Mile and Orchard Lake roads.

"They don't want to get out the recycling binches," said Roger Thompson, who leads both the recycling and newspaper drives.

"We have no problem getting people to contribute when we've got a big issue, like the battle for a couple of years ago," Mrs. Thompson said speaking of the battle against surrounding recycling places. "When things calm down, people seem to forget that some of us are still trying to get rid of our old waste."

The newspaper drive was announced by the last weekend prior to April 1, that picks up all the newspapers from Farmington area residents, noting that contributions would not be accepted if they weren't going to be used. The newspaper drive will be held this past month for recycling were aimed towards the drive sponsored by Boy Scout Troop 389, and she has no quarrel with that.

Her concern is that these types of drives happen every once in a while, yet paper recycling is a continuous task.

"WEED GROWERS are still are a very valuable resource and they will become more so," she said. "A few days

ago we had a meeting with the Boy Scouts and they are going to be able to use all the old newspapers the entire state of Michigan can provide."

She stressed that Earth Alive is not in competition with Boy Scouts or any one else who uses the collection of paper and paper products.

"What we want to do is get people back in the habit of saving them and filling up our containers," Mrs. Thompson said.

A reception and dinner hour will follow the performance.

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
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
