After enduring two years of winter's caprice, it seemed until mid-February that banner profits for beleaguered ski areas were on their way. But alas, it was not to be.
What do Michigan skiers do? They rejoice at the prospect of traveling to New England, the Rocky Mountains or Quebec. Fortunately for diehard Michigan skiers, those places now are enjoying what they longed for during the bulk of the winter — abundant snow to carry them into spring.

Spring sking is the alpha and omega for all downhill skiers, and even for cross-country types who wish to take their boards to downhill areas which provide excellent cross-country courses.

So far, spring sking in the Rockies, especially in Utah and Colorado, affords dry, mild air, light powder and easy hard-packed snow to cajole even the most jaded Michigan skier into a lulled sense of having died and gone to heaven.

IF YOU'RE ONE of the unfortunate who has never experienced the thrill of sliding down a mountain for 15 to 20 uninterrupted innutes in 50-and 60-degree weather with the western sun beating on your swimsuit-and-sweathirt-clad frame, it may be time to try

it.

Getting there isn't that difficult or expensive.

Airline super-saver rates are available and any carrier that flies to the West will be able to help you obtain the information best suited to your needs.

The secret to enjoying a Western spring-skiing jaunt is dressing in

layers for maximum confort.

In the Rocky Mountain spring, mornings often dawn quite coolly, and the slopes will be cold with hard-packed snow until the sun sheds its rays, warming your body and loosening the snow.

PACK A PARKA, down vest, lightweight sweater, a few turt-lenecks and a T-shirt or two. You'll probably be shedding most or all of those layers during the day, getting down to good suntan apparel

But don't forget that warm clothing should also be toted just in case of a not-unheard-of spring snowstorm.

Spring snow conditions means that the texture of the snow and weather are unpredictable, varying with the time and temperatures of the day.

Mornings usually offer cold, hard-packed snow that softens as the day grows warmer. You'll see hard-pack turn to slush-bumps in a matter of hours.

Stay flexible. Realize that the combinations of sunshine and clear, cold nights will provide great all-around skiing experiences rarely found in the Midwest.

Bring your favorite-pair of skis. Because the snow conditions change so rapidly, a good all-around ski works best. And remember to have those edges sharpened for the hard snow in the morning or for the south side of the bumps, even though you know there will be softer snow available after lunch.

In the long run (no pun intended), you needn't worry about toting special equipment.

SUNSHINE IN THE ROCKIES, especially to cloud-beleaguered southeast Michigan residents, can fry skiers to crispy critters, and sometimes provides unwanted surprises for the epidermis.

Rockies resorts are at high allitudes. The air is thin at 10,000 or

11,000 feet, allowing rare and rapid suntanning. Be liberal while using sunscreen since sunburn can be serious and painful.
