Health screening conducted at OCC

Oakland Community College is par-ticipating in "Project: Health-O-Rama" sponsored by Channel 7, Blue Cross-Blue Shield of Michigan and the United Blue Shield of Michigan and the United Health Organization. As part of the program. participants will receive free health tests on a walk-on basis at OCC's Southfield Campus from 10 a.m. to 6 pm. on March 30.

The tests, which ofter a health-care savings of up to \$150 per person, include tests for height, weight, vision,

blood pressure and anemia. Optional blood tests will be provided for a \$7 fee. These chemistries test for cholesterol, diabetes, liver disease and gout. Such blood tests usually cost \$50 to \$80. The Southfield Campus is located on 23222 Rutland just south of Nine Mile Road in Southfield. Tests will be conducted in the open area across from the Individualized Programmed Learning Laboratory.
