Liz Holtzman is SZ keynoter

At 31, she was the youngest woman elected to the House of Representatives. Nine years later, she is a former Congresswoman, having been defeated for the U.S. Senate last November.

On April 8, Elizabeth Holtzman, attorney, politician and public figure, will be the featured speaker at "Woman's World 1981" at Congregation Shavei Zedek in Southfield.

The all-day program, sponsored by the sisterhood, includes a continental breakfast and boutique shopping beginning at 10 a.m., a noon luncheon and the talk by Ms. Holtzman whose topic is: "The 1980's: A Challenge to the Jewish Woman."

Ms. Holtzman's affinity for politics was demonstrated back in high school days when she and her twin brother, Robert, ran a successful "Win With the Twins" campaign for vice president and president of the Abraham Lincoln High School student body.

In 1962, she was graduated magna cum laude from Radcliffe College where she received a bachelor's degree in American history and American literature.

A graduate of Harvard Law School, she was accepted to the New York State Bar in 1965 and joined a small law firm.

Two years later, she became a mayoral assistant to then New York City Mayor John V. Lindsay and acted a liaison between the mayor's office and the Department of Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs.

MS. HOLTZMAN achieved national political fame in 1972 when she defeated 50-year incumbent Democrat Emanuel Celler in the race for the New York 16th Congressional District seat in the U.S. House.

During four terms in Washington, she authored a number of successful pieces of legislation on issues pertaining to ERA, deportation of Nazi war criminals, lower property insurance rates for victims of redlining, and making cigarette bootlegging and child pornography federal crimes.

In 1976 she uncovered a fraud concerning a free summer food program for children in New York which led to conviction of corrupt officials and a more effective program.

Ms. Holtzman was a member of the Judiciary Committee and participated in impeachment deliberations concerning former President Nixon.

She was chairman of the Subcommittee on Immigration, Refugees and International Law, served on the House Budget Committee, chaired the Committee's Task Force on State and Local Government and was a member of the Select Committee on Aging in 1979.

Holtzman helped found and co-chaired the first Congressional Women's Caucus in 1977. She served as one of two House members on the President's National Commission on the Observance of International Women's Year.

SHE HAS won numerous awards for her work for the rights of children, women and Jewish causes. In 1972 she won a citation as one of the "Top Exceptional Young Women of 1972" by Mademoiselle Magazine.
