Area's junior bowlers hit lanes at early hour

Junior bowling is making great advances in high school activities throughout the metropolitan area and most of the new popularity is centered in Farmington where the school league swings in to real competition every Friday morning at 7:30.

For years Fred Hamlin did a yeoman's job at Farmington Lanes and now Bill Winkler, at Bel-Aire, has a group of 64 stepping to the foul lines and doing some great scoring. Recently Jim Mc Grath, who boasts a 191 average, came through with a 258 game.

This league is run in two sections and the winner of each collides at the close of the season for the title.

DAVE HAMILTON, one of the recent graduates of the juniors, is cutting a wide swath in the Bel-Aire Classic. Though he is only 19 years old, he is carrying a 198 average and is second only to the veteran, Billy G., who is at the top of the averages with 313.

This classic is fast becoming one of

the leaders in the area and scores are zoning. Last week Fred Vitoli posted a 771 on games of 279, 248 and 245. Following him were Jay Hunt with 732 and Dean Shiffman with 724.

CORA FEIBIG still keeps rolling along with the stars. Last Monday night at Luxury Lanes she turned in a 279 in 735 for one of the top scores in the Major League.

Meanwhile, Penny Behr's Bonanza team hit the national honor roll again with a 3172 series or games of 1130, 1037 and 955.

ALETA RZEPECKI, one of the rising young stars, had an odd experience in the mixed classic at Westland Bowl. She rolled 14 consecutive strikes and didn't get a perfect game. After sparing in the opening frame of her first game, she struck out with 10 in a row for 290. Then she opened the second game with four for a 212 and posted a series of 655.

Meanwhile, the men were splattering

the pins aplenty. Bob Jawor set the pace with a 283 in 764. He was followed by Bob Schmidt with 721. Al Colcer with 720 and Jim Mijal with 719.

TIM GARDELLA had a field day in the Pile Driver's League at Plaza Lanes when he posted a 279 game in a 771 series to outdistance his rivals by a wide margin. His closest rival was Mike Oliver with 665 Jerry Malsano landed third with 650. And Dorothy Jenkins showed the way to the ladies with a 633.

LEANDRA STOWSKI had one of her best nights in the Ladies Classic at Westland when she found the range for a 247 game and a 672 series. Nest he was Denise Rathbun with 647.

MARION HEATH dominated the Ladies Classic at Livonia by winning two of the three game series, taking the first with 178-39-218 and the third with 195-39-235. She then took the series with 520-117-637.

At Troy High North cops gymnastics state title

TROY was paced by sophomore Kathy Michaels, who finished sixth all-around with a score of 34.75. Senior teammate Lisa Boes was ninth all-around with a 34.00.

"I thought we did real well," said Troy coach Sandy Smith, whose team won the state title in 1974 and finished third last year.

"There was a lot of pressure on our kids going into the tournament. Plus the North Farmington and East Kentwood gymnasts did not make any mistakes.

"The whole difference was that we did not hit on our bars, and that cost us," she said.

As usual, the Coils sparked on the mat. Troy mustered 25.65 points in that event, while North Farmington was second (25.75).

Boes was second in floor exercises with a 9.00, and Michaels was seventh (8.70). Michele Smith had an 8.55 for the Coils.

Michaels was third on the balance beam, and Boes tied for seventh in that event.

Celeste Harrington of Walled Lake Central was seventh overall with a score of 34.70. Her best event of the afternoon was the vault where she finished second with a 9.25.

The other area gymnasts to make it among the top 10 were Andover's Missy Otterbein (eighth place tie in floor exercises) and Seaholm's Jenny Matz (tenth off the vault).

There were 39 schools and 87 gymnasts represented at the state meet. It was the first time ever that Troy High School has hosted a state meet.

Council authorized the transfer of \$5,000 from the Housing Rehabilitation Loans and Grants program to the Handicapped Sidewalk program.

There were no objections to the request for SDM Beer and Wine licenses made by Mr. Francis K. Cahill, 32454-36 Grand River, and the R-Mart Store at 37175 Grand River. Council accepted the final Cable Television Request for Proposal (RFP) and accepted the Franchise Ordinance, in principle, as proposed for cable television service to the City of Farmington.

A meeting was established for March 30, 1981 at 7:00 p.m. in the Farmington Hills City Council Chambers, to review the budget requests of agencies jointly funded by the City of Farmington and the City of Farmington Hills.

The following ordinance was adopted:

ORDINANCE NO. C-475-81

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 1.76 OF CHAPTER 4 OF TITLE I, ADMINISTRATION, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

1.76 Minimum Standards Adopted. The minimum employment standards for law enforcement officers as established and adopted by the Michigan Law Enforcement Officers Training Council in accordance with Act No. 203, Public Acts of 1965, are hereby adopted as follows:

STANDARDS

Be a citizen of the United States.
 Minimum age of eighteen (18) years.
 Educational attainment as established by administrative policy of the City, but not less than graduation from an accredited high school or have attained a passing score on the General Education Development Test indicating a high school graduation level.
 Fingerprinting of the applicant with a search of local, state and national fingerprint files to disclose any criminal record.
 The applicant shall not have been convicted of a felony offense.
 Good moral character as determined by a favorable comprehensive background investigation covering school and employment records, home environment and personal traits and integrity. Consideration will be given to all law enforcement activities including traffic and conservation law convictions, as indicating a lack of good character.
 Possess normal hearing, normal color vision and normal visual functions. Visual acuity without correction shall be not less than 20/40 in one eye and 20/100 in the other eye, correctable to 20/20 in each eye through the comfortable wearing of ordinary glasses or contact lens without prismatic displacement, ghost images or similar symptoms, or as required to correct complicated impairments such as keratoconus, congenital scars, irregular astigmatism, etc.
 Be free from any other impediment of the senses, physically sound, in possession of his extremities and well developed physically, with height and weight in relation to each other as indicated by accepted medical standards. He may be free from any physical defects, chronic diseases, organic diseases, organic or functional conditions, or mental and emotional instabilities which may tend to impair the efficient performance of his duty or which may endanger the lives of others or himself.
 Acceptable physical, emotional and mental fitness as established by a licensed physician following examination to determine the applicant is free from any physical, emotional or mental condition which might adversely affect his performance of duty as a public safety officer.
 A declaration of the applicant's medical history shall be required and become a part of the background investigation. The information shall be available to the examining physician.
 A selection process shall be utilized as established by administrative policy of the City, but such process shall include a minimum of an oral interview to determine the applicant's acceptability for a public safety officer position and his appearance, background and ability to communicate.
 Recruitment and employment practices and standards shall be in compliance with existing Michigan Statutes governing this activity.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on December 1, 1980, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting of the Council on December 15, 1980, and will become effective ten days after publication. The necessary bills were approved for printing.
 The meeting was adjourned at 10:00 p.m.
