There is an old saying along the bowling front that you always can expect the unexpected.
That's what happened on the first day of the men's city tournament last Saturday at Satellite Bowl when Mike Ariman, a substitute with a 174 average, put together games of 253, 235 and 216 for 704 in the team event.
It marked the first time in the long history of the tourney that the 700 barrier had been broken on opening day.
Meanwhile, a team calling itself the Niners from B'Nai B'rith rolled into top place with a 3247 count that may be hard to beat.

BOB GOIKE JR. had a great weekend and struck his claim as one of the top bowlers in the area.

Starting on Friday night, he paced the Mixed Classic at Westland Bowl with a 747 on games of 267, 247 and 233.

From there, he went to Saginaw and won his first title in the Michigan Majors Bowling Association. He averaged 229 and won nine of his 12 matches to come home with the \$1,000 first prize.

In the Westland Classic, Golke had two companions in the 700 class. Mike Harris took runner-up honors with a 267 middle game in 716 and Dick Bond used a 257 opener for a 707 and third place.

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington City Council was held on April 6, 1981 in the Council Chambers, 3690 Liberty Street, at 8:00 P.M.
PRESENT: Mayor Hartssock, Councilmen Bennett, Mitchell, Tupper and Yoder.
CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT: City Manager Deaman, Director Billing, Director Seifert, Attorney Kelly, City Clerk Viane.
Minutes of the previous meeting were approved.
Minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.
A Public Hearing was held to receive input on proposed uses for the 1981-82 Federal Revenue Sharing funds.
Members of the Farmington "8" Lions Club presented a check in the amount of \$300.00 as a contribution to the Farmington Historical Museum.
Council endorsed the "SAVE-A-LIFE" Program for the City of Farmington, and issued a proclamation for "SAVE-A-LIFE" Week.
A resolution was adopted urging our legislators to expedite the appropriation to reimburse local units of government for out-of-pocket expenditures to conduct the May, 1980 Presidential Election.
Council was advised that the City of Farmington will participate in Mayor's Exchange Day with the City of Charlotte.
Council authorized Plans & Moran to evaluate the revenue needs of the city's Water and Sewer System in view of the recent rate increases from Oakland County to become effective after June 1, 1981.
