# Senate says no to export grants

Here's how area senators and House members were recorded on recent floor votes.

SENATE

EXPATE

Export Trading Companies: The Senate prevented, 68-25, the spending of \$2 million over three years in Commerce
Department grants to help small companies hire specialists to spur their overseas sales. A company would have used the federal grant to pay one-half (up to \$40,000) the first-year cost of hirling an export manager.

The vote occurred during debate on a bill enabling small firms to establish "export trading companies" for tapping world markets they now ignore for lack of capital and expertise. The hill, later sent to the House on an uncontested vote, eases anti-trust laws and allows banks to become parthers in export trading companies.

\$\frac{1}{2}\$ Sponsor William Armstrong, RColo, said the hiring of export managers by companies "is a proper business function, not a proper function of government."

Opponent Donald Riegle, D.Mich, called the \$2 million "an absolutely modest amount" baving high leverage in terms of opening up export markets, reducing our balance-of-payments deficit, and creating jobs in the U.S. Senators voting "nay" wanted to spend federal grants to help small companies hire export managers. Michigan's other Democrat, Carl Levin, and Riegle voted 'nay."

Sobidifuge Export Companies: By a vote of \$5-38, the Senate tabled an attempt to authorize \$25 million over five years to help newly formed export reading companies sell their products foreign markets.

Tabling of the \$25 million outlay (a corpromise figure down from the originally proposed \$50 million) means that the export trading companies will be their own financially and not subsized by federal agencies such as the "conomic Development Administration and Small Business Administration."

Sen. William Armstrong, R-Colo, a supporter of eliminating the \$25-million authorization, said the money was welfare for exporters' and that 'as one who has voted ... to curb that growth of welfare in this country, I personally arm not about to vote to pay for this kind of program.'
Sen. John Heinz, R-Pa, disagreed, saying that while he acknowledges "that budget priorities are chapting" the \$25 million expenditure shadul be approved "in the spirit of compromise

Senators voting "nay" favored spending the \$25 million to help newly formed export trading companies get into operation. Levin and Riegle voted "nay."

Natural Gas: The Senate tabled, 66-27, an amendment stating Senate sup-port of phased-in rather than immedi-ate lifting of federal controls on natu-ral gas prices. The administration sig-nals it may ask Congress to enact legislation immediately decontrolling natural gas prices.

The amendment was superfluous because it asked senators to reaffirm what already is law — gradual removal of gas controls through 1985. And it was not germane to the export legislation under debate (\$734, see preceding pages)

in the ongoing debate and that "as a
practical matter (it) does nothing that
is not already the law of the land."
Opponent J. J. Exon, R-Neb., said the

Senators voting "nay" wanted to restate opposition to immediate decontrol even while conceding their votes were legislatively toothless.


#### Self-hypnosis course offered
