

Awrey introduces 'not so sweet' label

Awrey Bakeries, Inc., has 12 items under its new "Not-So-Sweet" label available in more than 1,000 stores in Southeastern Michigan.

The 12 items are primarily baked goods which do not have icing, such as muffins, pound cakes, banana bread and plain fried cake donuts. The frosting-less baked goods are generally lower in sugar and carbohydrates than their counterparts. These items will be separate from other items, and easily identified by the new label.

"This is a customer service in response to a part of our market which requires a baked good with lower sugar content," explained Robert Awrey, president of the 71-year-old Detroit bakery.

"We felt it was appropriate to identify to our customers those products which may serve their need in this area since we know the ingredients better than anyone."

Awrey is the largest family-owned quality sweet goods bakery in the United States. The firm was founded in Detroit in 1910 and today serves the supermarket retail trade from its bakery at 18301 Farmington Road (between Plymouth Road and the Jeffries Freeway) in Livonia.

Several Awreys are active in the bakery business, which has been headquartered in Livonia since 1967. Robert C. Awrey is president while wife Betty Jean operates the \$1.5 million a year in sales at the hot oven thrift store adjacent to the bakery. Son Tom is Retail Sales Director and daughter Linda is National Accounts Sales Representative.

At present there are approximately 700 employees engaged in producing baked goods for over 500 distributing warehouses, institutions, restaurants and bakers throughout the United States (including Hawaii) and Canada.
