# OCC neutral on Proposal A

Oakland Community College will take no position on Proposal A on the May 19 ballot.
"I think we ought to sit still," said board Chairman Earl Anderson. By their silence, the six other trustees agreed.

OCC will be nearly alone in its position. "The Michigan Community College Association appears headed for an endorsement, and other education-oriented organizations have already done so," said President Robert F. Roelofs.

ROELOFS GAVE the board an analysis of Proposal A, which would reduce all local operating property taxes by half, reimburse local units with the new revenue from increasing the sales tax from 4 percent to 5.5 percent, and "cap" annual property tax increases by class of property at 6 percent. "While we will theoretically be compensated for the lost property tax recipits," he said, "we will invertedess have a net overall decrease in revenue form the combination of property tax and state aid."


And while inflation is running at 13.5 percent, Proposal A would limit growth of property tax bills to 6 percent, he said.

ONE MAIN reason Gov. William C.
Milliken and bipartisan legislative
leaders put forth Proposal A was to
head off efforts for a more dresite tax
cut advocated by Shiawassec County
Drain Commissioner Robert Tisch.
"The theory behind this tax revision
is that it would blunt a Tisch III effort.
However, there is no hard evidence

that Tisch III would be thwarted or de-feated," said Roelofs, adding:
"Nothing will fend off Mr. Tisch."
Proposal A will be the only item on the special statewide May 19 ballot. If it passes, it will begin to take effect in July 1981.

Roelofs noted, "Any formulation of Tisch III cannot be voted upon until November of 1982. Therefore, it will not impact our 1981-82 budget and, in all likelihood, would have only a balf-year effect on 1982-3."
