CITY COUNCIL MEETING

APRIL 27, 1981

Farmington Hills City Council held a special meeting April 27, 1981. Mayor Wolf opened the meeting at 7:30 p.m. Members present were Burwell, Soronen, Oppenheimer, Wolf, Alkateb, Lange and Delan. Others present were City Manager Savage, City Clerk Cairns and City Attorney Bibeau.

Council approved the minutes of April 13, 1981.

Council adopted a resolution in opposition to H.B. 4125 update the "Abandoned Vehicle Law."

Council approved the revision of the Economic Development Corporation Plan for Hunter's Square Project by amended resolution, until May 11, 1981.

Amendment resolution for the revision of Economic Development Corporation Project Plan for the Rouse Company was adopted to May 11, 1981.

Council adopted a resolution re: general rules for all Boards and Commissions.

Council adopted a resolution re: Farmington Area Commission on Aging, purpose, objectives and membership.

Council enacted C82-245 zoning map amendment from RA-2 to OS-1 in the NW 1/4 of Section 11, parcel 101-108.

Zoning text amendment C82-FF, Section 2112, public hearing notices regarding Special Approval Applications was enacted, and summary approved.

Council enacted zoning text amendment C82-252, to require public hearings before City Council in consideration of Planned Unit Development, Cluster Option and Planned Residential Development Plans, and summary approved.

Council enacted zoning text amendment C82-11, which would delete "Off-Street Parking" as a principal permitted use in the Office and Business classification, and approved the summary.

Approval was given amending the Bonding resolution to provide for alternate locations for bids for the Lincolnshire Road Improvement Special Assessment Bonds.

Approval was given the easement agreement for the Construction of sanitary sewer facilities to serve the Industrial/Research/Office District on Howard Road between Highland and Haggerty Roads Special Assessment District C147.

Council introduced an ordinance granting option to Detroit Baptist Manor, Inc., or the Metropolitan Detroit Baptist Manor, Inc., for the sale of the five acres of City owned property located at Freedom and Drake Roads.

Council approved the low bid for Howard Road sanitary sewer in the amount of \$1,067,773, to Pacific & Forest Construction Co.

Approval of the Traffic Control Order for U-Turn prohibition of all vehicular traffic on Orchard Lake Road between the eastbound I-696 ramp and Springland Drive.

A necessity was declared for soil stabilization road improvement for Springland, LaMara, Old Homestead, part of Pleasant Valley, Franklin Knolls, Franklin Fairway Subdivision and Halsted Road from 31-428-016 to 32-301-031 and set the Cost Hearing for May 19, 1981.

It was the consensus of the Council to authorize the Mayor to notify Ingersoll and Rand regarding the Industrial Facilities Exemption Certificate for Diamond Automation Division of Diamond International Corporation for a period of two years.

PROPOSITION A

PROPOSAL TO REDUCE PROPERTY TAXES, REDUCE CITY INCOME TAXES, LIMIT GROWTH OF PROPERTY TAX REVENUES, RETURN ADDITIONAL SALES TAX TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS AND SCHOOLS AND GIVE STATE LOTTERY PROFITS TO SCHOOL AID FUND.

The proposed amendment would:

- Reduce by 50% homesteaded property taxes used for operating schools and local governments. Reduction limited to \$1,400.00 in 1981 and changed yearly in home value change.
- Reduce by 50% local individual income taxes on first \$40,000 of taxable income.
- Make state return to local governments all funds lost by above reductions.
- Limit yearly property tax revenue growth to 6% by property type unless related by local voters.
- Reduce sales tax from 4% to 3.5%. Sales must be returned to local governments and schools.
- Let forms and fees be assessed at cost.
- Give state lottery profits to school aid fund.
