#### Tax Rate . Up 1.95 Mills In'69

The Clarenceville School Board has approved a budget of \$2,765,205 for the 1968-9 school year following a pub-lic hearing last week.

Ile-fisating last week.

Actition on the budget had to
be deflayed until a special elecdiffonal mills for operating,
the millage was approved by
the voters in late July and gave
the bodrd an opportunity to resume bargaining with the CEA
and other organizations representing employes.

The budget, which is up \$359, 802 over that of a year ago, reflects the increasing cost of providing constantly improvating educational programs, an increased enrollment of more than 100 students; and the traceased costs of operation by providing a competitive salary schedule for all employes,

At the same time, the board established the tax rate for the new school year at 37,90 mil with 30,90 for operating and seven for debt retirement,

This represents an increase
of 1.85 mills over 1867-8, it
was accomplished by increasgroup operations by four mills
