

C'ville Expects Record

With the start of classes Wednesday to open the 1968-9 school term, Clarenceville School District is looking forward to a record enrollment from K through 12.

Supt. David McDowell indicated that work on the fall term officially begins Tuesday with orientation sessions for teachers and students at all schools.

The regular school schedules are as follows:

Boisford and Edgewood schools, 8:50 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Grandview and Westbrook, 8:20 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.; Junior High 9:10 a.m. to 3:45 p.m.; and senior high, 8:10 a.m. to 3:15 p.m.

Kindergarten sessions at all schools will be held in the mornings from 8:30 a.m. to 11:20 p.m. and afternoons from 12:30 p.m. to 3 p.m.

Special classes in elementary schools will meet from 8:20 a.m. to 1:45 p.m.

Supt. McDowell stressed that bus schedules may be obtained in the administration offices of each elementary and secondary building.

Teachers Get Gains At C'ville

The Clarenceville School Board has approved a contract with the Teachers' Association for an economic package that reflects a total increase of approximately 10 per cent.

Agreement on the pact was reached a week ago by negotiating teams from the administration and the association. The board approved the contract this week, and the CEA will hold a ratification meeting Tuesday at 7:30 a.m.

Details of the agreement were not available, pending the final ratification by the teachers. In addition to the teacher's agreement, the school board has concluded contracts with custodial, maintenance and cafeteria workers and the Secretarial Association of Clarenceville.

The only contract still hanging is that with the bus drivers.

Tax Rate Up 1.95 Mills In '69

The Clarenceville School Board has approved a budget of \$2,765,205 for the 1968-9 school year following a public hearing last week.

Action on the budget had to be delayed until a special election on a request for four additional mills for operating. The millage was approved by the voters in late July and gave the board an opportunity to resume bargaining with the CEA and other organizations representing employees.

The budget, which is up \$359,802 over that of a year ago, reflects the increasing cost of providing constantly improving educational programs; an increased enrollment of more than 100 students; and the increased costs of operation by providing a competitive salary schedule for all employees.

At the same time, the board established the tax rate for the new school year at 37.90 mill with 30.90 for operating and seven for debt retirement.

This represents an increase of 1.95 mills over 1967-8. It was accomplished by increasing operations by four mills and reducing the debt retirement millage by 2.05.

The board took this action to hold the tax rate at as low a rate as possible.
