Church Leaders Attend Crime Prevention Lab

More than 100 clergymen and lay church leaders of all denominations are taking part in a 12-week "Laboratory for Religious Leaders on Crime Prevention" at Wayne State University.

The federally sponsored program began Feb. 17. It is aimed at getting churchmen involved with the problems of the community.

"Churches have the resources that can be brought to bear on drugs, teenage runaways and pariahs," said Rev. David E. Kidd, United Methodist chaplain at WSU's Wesley Foundation, and one of three conference coordinators.

REV. KIDD said these resources include time, concern, buildings, and money. "There are whole congregations of concerned people, but they don't know where to begin," Rev. Kidd said. "We hope this conference will help them develop some answers. We hope they get Farmington, and lay church leaders of all denominations are taking part in a 12-week "Laboratory for Religious Leaders on Crime Prevention" at Wayne State University.
