It has been found that boredom is one of the worst problems inmates face and reading material is one of the best ways to fight that problem, explains project chairman Lee Arthurs.

The Jaycees are asking all members of the community for donations of any books they have or can collect for this worthwhile cause. Needless to say, all efforts will be appreciated by the inmates at Jackson.

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This year, trees may be purchased for planting on private property as well as on public right-of-ways. The trees will be delivered in mid-April for planting.

Pin Oaks are available for residents in Farmington Meadows and Farmington Acres. Imperial Locusts are available for Twin Valley and Norway Maples for all other areas.

THE SUGAR MAPLE, offered last year, is being discontinued because it did not fare well in Farmington soil. Last year, the first time trees were offered, about 300 were planted. Only about 28 trees died, the majority of which were sugar maples. Some 55 sugar Maples were planted in Alta Loma Subdivision last year and 22 died.

Cost of trees to be planted on public right-of-way is \$20. The DPW will plant the trees and guarantee them for two years. If the tree dies of natural causes, it will be replaced the following year.

Trees planted on private property can be purchased for \$14. The trees are not guaranteed and must be planted by the homeowner.

The trees will be between 1 1/4-1 1/2 inches in diameter and 10-12 feet tall.
