on the bottom than on the top, With a protective piece of paper, apply pressure with a hard rubber roller to insure a permanent, high-strength bond. Always remember to use this spray adhesive in a room with adequate ventilation.

ANOTHER PRODUCT for mounting photographs is 567 Positionable Mounting Adhesive (PMA) sheets. No heat, no mees, and no expensive equipment are required.

PMA makes a permanent bond and has the advantage of being repositionable if you should incorrectly place your photo on the mounting board.

ran comes in different sizes and is protected by two cover sheet. First, remove one cover sheet exposing the adhesive. Place against the back of the photograph and apply pressure with the squeegee furnished in the package.

Then remove the second cover sheet and press the photograph against the mount board (remem-

ber it's repositionable). Apply firm pressure a sec-ond time with the squeegee, and a permanent bond

is obtained.

If you'll be doing a lot of cold mounting, 3M makes a pressure applicator that uses PMA in rolls. No electricity is needed, and you can process more than one print at a time.

FOR THOSE of you who own a dry mounting press, there is a product that eliminates tacking, uses a relatively low 180° temperature, and is also repositionable. It's called Pro-Mount, and to mel's a very exciting product.

It's much easier to use than dry mounting tissue and is safe for all types of color photographs. The adhesives sheat is applied to the print similar to that of PMA 507, and no trimming is required as with conventional dry mounting tissue removed, position on the mounting board and the property of the production on the mounting board and puly pressure to keep the photo in place. Then put in your dry mounting press for 45 seconds to obtain a lasting bond.

By reapplying heat at any future time, your photograph can be easily removed from the mounting board.

Invest in the future, says U-M's Shapiro

The nation must "continue investing in its future" by pro-viding for "very modest real growth" — instead of redu-tions — in the National Science Foundation's budget, Uni-versity of Michigan president told a Congressional commit-

tee.
President Harold T. Shapiro, testifying before the Senate
Subcommittee on Science, Technology and Space, said the
NSF holds "a crucial role among government agencies because it is responsible for the overall health of U.S. science

"However, the present budget request will not enable the foundation to meet this important responsibility. This situation has serious implications for the future." Shapire, an economist, noted that the NSF budget should

be considered "in the broader context of the country's very real economic problems.
"In the last decade, the U.S. economy has lost significant momentum," he said. Productivity growth rates have been declining; investment in new plant and equipment has been inadequate; the U.S. position in world trade has slipped con-siderably; inflation shows signs of becoming a chronic condi-tion.

tion. The reasons for the current economic plight are "many and complex," Shapiro said, and it will take "wisdom and patience" to resolve the difficulty. If sacrifices are needed, he noted, higher education, including the major research universities, ought to shoulder some of the burdee in order to return the economy to a non-inflationary growth path.

But the proposed NSF budget "could impair the continuing vitality of U.S. science and the major research university and threaten our long-run economic renewal and our nation-al potential for participating in the developments of the next decades," Sharpiro said.

decades," Sharpiro said.

"U.S. universities are the country's main source of new knowledge and highly trained people. Budgetary policies which unwisely harm their ability to discharge these responsibilities will adversely affect the quality of our national life."

Among the "unfortunate implications" of the NSF budget

Among the "unfortunate implications" of the NSF budget for research universities. Shapiro said, are:

• A \$100 million initiative which would help universities replace obsolete research equipment has been deferred.

• The proposed phasing out of NSF fellowship would mean that "some outstanding students will not continue their education and will not, therefore, enter the work force as highly trained scientists and engineers."
