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Michigan Council for the Arts has es-tablished siz new pilot grants pro-prems which will aid gon-profile organ-tations who primarily serve minorities — the handfeapped or economically and culturally disadvantages. The siz programs are: • Touring — In order to make re-sources and talents more widely avail-able, touring grants will support tra-bit fees, transportation, sets, costumes, choreography, exhibition costs, rentats. Priority will be given to groups who exhibit or perform regularly. This pro-gram has a maximum award of \$20,00. Market development — These grants will assist in developing greater vibility for minority or disadvantaged groups. Grants will support promotion and advertising costs and materials, packaging, distribution and other mar-vite funds up to \$20,000. Berooment — These grants support arts activities and train-

Ing to generate revenue and employ-ment for Michigan artists and crafts-men including seed money for arts/ crafts cottage industries, co-op record-ing, galleries, shows and restivals. These grants will provide up to \$20,000. • Facilities improvements for fa-cilities that are designed for art activi-tes. This new program will provide up to \$8,000 for specific improvements or space-rental.

Pilot programs/planning -- This open category will support research/ project design and planning required to initiate new experimental projects in-cluding, but rol limited to internships, feasibility studies, marketing plans, start-up costs. This grant will provide to \$10,000 for support of these new urolects.

projects. • Cultural preservation — This pro-gram is designed to support preserva-tion activities including exhibits, video and film projects, silde catelogs, col-lection and preservation of artifacts,
