Hills police offer baby sitter's clinic

The Farmington Hills Police Department, Juvenile Division, will sponsor a baby sitters' clinic for both the experienced and inexperienced sitters in proper techniques of responsible baby sitting.

This six-hour program consists of two three-hour afternoon sessions at participant's choice of either Power or Warner middle schools.

The Power Middle School clinic will be held on June 9 and 11 from 3:30-6:30 p.m. each day.

The Warner Middle School clinic will be held on June 16 and 18 from 3:30-6:30 p.m. each day.

The clinics are open to all Farmington Hills residents.

Instructors will be representatives of the Farmington Hills Police Department, Farmington Hills Fire Department and Oakland County Public Health Department. They will cover

such topics as CPR, general first aid, fire and personal safety, baby-sitting duties and responsibilities and child psychology.

Any person who is 13 years of age or older or has completed the seventh grade will be eligible to receive a Race for Life first-aid certificate from the American Red Cross. Anyone who successfully completes this six-hour program will receive a certificate of participation from the Farmington Hills Police Department.

Those interested in attending the clinic must complete the registration form, indicate their choice of school and, in the case of a minor, have a parent or guardian's signature.

The registration form must be returned to the Farmington Hills Police or, in the case of middle- or high-school students, to the school general office by Friday, June 5.

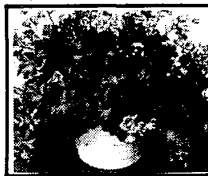
