The Oakland County Volunteer Bureau, a program of the Volunteer Action Center of United Community Services, has weekly listings of volunteer opportunities. Further information needs and those other volunteer needs at more than 200 agencies may be obtained by calling the Bureau at 642-7272. Any non-profit organization needing volunteer assistance may also call the Bureau.

OFFICE AND PUBLICITY VOLUNTEERS — The Furniture Resource Center provides a vital service in finding donated furniture and distributing it to people who need it such as fire victims. Office volunteers are needed in the Center's Pontiac office. Half a day per month is asked, and duties include answering the telephone, handling agency referrals and helping clients with furniture pickups. Volunteers are also needed to present a slide show on the Center community organizations.

HOME VISITORS AND DRIVERS — Drivers are needed by the Royal Oak Senior Citizens Center to transport seniors for doctor visits, shopping and other errands. Volunteers are also recruited to visit homebound seniors to share a recreational activity such as knitting, playing cards or arts and crafts. Orientation is provided, and hours are flexible.

OFFICE WORKERS — The Michigan Heart Association needs volunteers in its Southfield or Troy offices to fill literature requests, do office work and schedule educational talks. The commitment is four to eight hours a week for at least one year.

Travelers Aid Society needs compassionate and responsible persons at Metropolitan Airport and Greyhound Bus Station offices to give direction, find interpreters for foreign travelers and help in crisis situations. Commitments of four regularly scheduled hours any day between 9 a.m. and 10 p.m. are requested.

Remember courage of these Jews

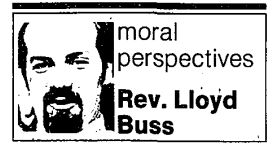
How long will it be before we forget? Forget what courage and character they exhibited in their protests. Forget how narrow the line between tolerable and intolerable conditions. Forget how narrow the line between civil and inhumane treatment. Forget how great a price is paid for political and social change.

Jacobo Timerman was Argentina's best known (and controversial) journalist when he was seized from his apartment in 1977 and held captive for two years.

Tortured in barbaric sessions, subjected to cruelty and persistent humiliation, Timerman was freed after two rulings of the Argentine Supreme Court and intensive international pressure by Patricia Derian, the U.S. assistant secretary of state of human rights in Carter's administration. Two hours after his flight from Argentina, an unsuccessful military coup was staged in anger at his liberty.

In his book, "Prisoner Without a Name, Cell Without a Number," Timerman expresses his conviction that his guilt (no charges were ever made against him) in the minds of the Nazi clique kidnapping him was that he is a Jew. His own sense of tragedy was the silent complicity of the Jewish leaders of Argentina, who were trying to maintain some position of survival in the troubled time.

BUT WHAT ABOUT the rest of the people of this world?



As Timerman notes: "If you add up all the victims and victimizers, they form such a small percentage of the world population. What are the others engaged in?"

For Stephen Joseph and Eugene Babb, dissent did not follow the route of clandestine arrest and barbaric torture, but took the form of voluntary resignation from high-level government jobs.

Both were executives in the Agency for International Development until May 17, when they resigned in disagreement with United States' government policy to vote in opposition to the World Health Assembly adopting an international code on the distribution of infant formulas to Third World Countries.

Both Joseph and Babb make the careful distinction that the final vote of 118 to 1 in favor of the World Health Organization reflects the stand of the U.S. government and not the U.S. people against the

regulation of infant formula sales.

For them, that difference is very important, because they believe that one person or two, or more, can make a difference, and their stand can be the beginning of changing the decision of our government.

JACOBO TIMERMAN ends his story with no concluding message. Living now in Israel, he writes "It is with this sensation — of being distant from the Nazi paranoia that suddenly overcame the most advanced nation of Latin America, as it once overcame the most advanced nation of Europe... that I come to the end of my story."

As for Stephen Joseph and Eugene Babb, they have two more weeks to clean out their offices and prepare their final reports.

No one would want to suggest that the experiences of Babb and Joseph equal the experience of Jacobo Timerman. Resigning from positions with highly employable skills and experiences is hardly to be compared to the violence of kidnapping, sadistic torture and mock executions.

Yet there is a kindred spirit among those who understand the moment of protest and act upon it. In Timerman's view, we would be neither victims or victimizers, but rather the rest of the world. Our silence in these matters of life can transform us into accomplices. Remembering their acts of courage and character would be one step in the recognition of humanity's worth and purpose.
